
HEY, KIDS OF CHRIST!

FAITHFUL FACTS!

Pope Francis holds the unique distinction of being the only pope to open—but not close—the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica during a Jubilee Year.

Only one other pope, Innocent XII, was buried while the Holy Doors remained open. Gravely ill after proclaiming the Holy Year in 1699, he delegated the door's opening to the Vice-Dean Cardinal de Bouillon. After his death in 1700, his successor, Clement XI, closed the doors.
