### **RITUAL OF TRANSITION:** For Secondary Churches that will not be having Sunday Masses

Community representative:

Let us remember the times we have gathered for the sacred Liturgy: the Triduum kept each year, the Sundays on which we worshiped faithfully, the first communion celebrations, the feast days of saints and martyrs, the marriages witnessed here; the funerals held here in hope.

God our refuge, our home is in you.

You are greater than any church building that can be built by human hands, yet in this place we have met your divine presence.

This church building has been a place of blessing for us.

Protect us on our way.

Lead us to a new assembly of your faithful people.

Through Christ our Lord. R./ Amen.

Delegate one or more members (for example, the president of the pastoral council, the eldest member of the parish or the youngest) to carry an object (or objects) that will be used in the new place (such as a sacred vessel, an icon or the book of the Gospels.) If there are relics that have been removed from the altar, these may also be carried out. The presider presents the delegated persons with the objects they will carry, and says:

Presider:

The life of this community will continue in another place. (Name of new parish), receive this (name of items) that will be used in our new home.

Take it as a sign that our journey of faith will continue there.

The final blessing may be taken from among the solemn blessings found in the Missal #12, 13 or 14.

During the singing of the final hymn, all may be invited to come forward and kiss the altar or offer a profound bow as a final gesture of leave-taking. All process out of the building.

Community representative, outside:

Let us now take a few moments, within the silence of our own hearts, to thank God for our worship here and to say "farewell" to this sacred space as we have known it.

An adaptation of the rite could be to allow people to say the names or tell the stories of those who were baptized, reconciled, married, or buried from this place. The feasibility of this will depend on the size and nature of the assembly. The presider must carefully and sensitively coordinate the flow of these remembrances and gracefully bring them to closure so that the service is not unduly prolonged. The presider might add the invocation "And so we say, 'Blessed be God for ever." After each remembrance, long or short, II would respond, "Blessed be God for ever."
