Prayer Resources for Parishes during Planning

The Liturgical Commission and the Office of Worship of the Diocese of Erie have prepared a series of prayers and prayer services designed to be helpful in the coming weeks and months as parishes work on restructuring.

These materials have been created and assembled for use in the Diocese of Erie by the Erie Diocese Liturgical Commission. Please direct any questions or feedback to the Office of Worship.

Ritual prayer is essential in times of change to allow communities to recognize, name and address possible emotions of anxiety, fear, and even anger. The following prayer tools are meant to assist your community in processing the news of the parish changes ahead.

- A simple prayer service with reflection and sharing opportunities; ready-to-print format
- Reflection prayers that may be used to extend or replace parts of the simple prayer service
- · Additional prayers for private or communal reflection

• Intercessions: Related to concerns over anxiety, fear, anger for use with prayer services General intercessions on the parish restructuring that may be used at Sunday (Saturday evening) Liturgies

Suggestions:

- Use these prayer tools whenever a group of parishioners are interested in gathering and combine with a social setting of coffee and donuts, pizza, etc.
- Create a prayerful environment that symbolizes Christ's presence, especially if not in the church worship space. Light a candle as a sign of Christ; display a Bible or a crucifix as a sign of God's Word and image of Christ's sacrifice; prepare a vase of flowers as a sign of God's creation.
- Utilize music that is sing-able and appropriate to the prayer. Music often touches us more deeply than words alone. Ask your music ministry to support the prayer. Call the Office of Worship if you need a musician in your area.
- Encourage the use of multiple ministries as lector, cantor, facilitator and leader.
- Leave room for silence to allow people to process feelings and emotions.
- Create a welcoming and safe environment where people can speak of their feelings without fear of recrimination.
- Consider providing writing materials for those who process ideas and emotions, more easily on paper.
- Remind participants to use the "I" format when speaking and address their own feelings. Prayer is not the time to propose alternatives or place blame for the current plan.

PRAYER SERVICES FOR THE PARISH RESTRUCTURING PROCESS INCLUDING ALL STAND-ALONE PARISHES, SEPTEMBER 2016

Prayer is the center and the lifeblood of Christian life offered in response to our every joy and sorrow. The parish restructuring process is no exception. Here is an opportunity to invite parishioners more deeply into the restructuring process. The pastoral planning prayer was woven into our gatherings from the beginning. Every parish was asked to pray it. This package extends our prayer resources to give voice to the varied experiences of parishioners whether they are partnering, merging or remaining as a stand-alone parish.

These prayer services

- **RESPOND TO NEEDS:** Parishioners may react in a variety of ways to the restructuring announcement. As they anticipate a new reality, parishioners may experience strong emotions. Communal prayer can provide an environment to express and process feelings of anxiety, fear and denial. Additional services can offer a path toward building hope, trust and acceptance of an uncertain future while honoring and revering a shared past.
- OFFER RELEVANT PRAYERS: The prayer services in this packet were prepared by the Diocesan Liturgical Commission, comprised of ordained and laity who represent all corners of the diocese. Working with the Office of Worship to assist the bishop and parish leadership in the spiritual care of the people of the Diocese of Erie, the commission has envisioned a variety of parish responses to restructuring and has prepared relevant prayers.
- **ARE FLEXIBLE** and may be used in many ways. Here's how:

First, *identify your need or goal* ---- Choose the service(s) that you think will work best for your community now and throughout the transition process. Second, look for opportunities — Parish groups may have varying needs and may be available at differing times. Ministry groups, committee meetings, small Christian communities can gather to pray. The entire parish community might gather. Third, discern who leads — To provide the greatest flexibility, services are designed to be led by a priest, deacon, or experienced lay leader. The pastor may not always be available. Prayer should happen anyway. Fourth, prepare carefully - Services are designed in a simple two-page, 8 1/2" X 11" format. They can be printed easily and used immediately. Options for readings and music are noted. Contact the Office of Worship for a Microsoft Publisher or Word version, if you wish to modify the service further to better suit your needs. Finally, engage the senses -Prayer is more than words. Whether you gather in church or in a meeting room, establish a reflective mood and environment. Light a candle; enthrone a Bible; prepare a vase of flowers. Use music-even unaccompanied-to set the mood and draw people together. Leave sufficient time for silence, especially during the period of reflection. A time of sharing among individuals, small groups or entire communities, is also a valuable component.

GREETING

We have gathered here this *morning/day/evening*, to place our future in God's hands.

As we pray through our uncertainly, our disbelief, our anger, or our hurt...all of our deeply felt emotions...let us remember that God has called us by name and desires to give us a future full of hope.

And so, let us pray...

O God, come to my assistance. *R/. Lord, make haste to help me.*

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

R/. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

SONG: Healer of Our Every III (Haugen/GIA) [or Though the Mountains May Fall (Schutte/OCP]

Psalm 46 (please sit)

Assembly: alternating sides

Side I God is for us a refuge and strength, an ever-present help in time of distress: So we shall not fear though the earth should rock, though the mountains quake to the heart of the sea; even though its waters rage and foam, even though the mountains be shaken by its tumult.

ALL The Lord of hosts is with us: The God of Jacob is our stronghold.

Side II Come and behold the works of the Lord, the awesome deeds he has done on the earth. He puts an end to wars over all the earth; the bow he breaks, the spear he snaps, the shields he burns with fire: "Be still and know that I am God, exalted over all the earth."

ALL The Lord of hosts is with us: The God of Jacob is our stronghold.

SCRIPTURE (1Corinthians 2:1a, 3-5, 7-11)

A reading from the first letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians:

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, proclaiming the mystery of God, I came to you in weakness and fear and much trembling, and my message and my proclamation were not with persuasive words of wisdom,

but with a demonstration of spirit and power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.

For we speak God's wisdom, mysterious and hidden, which God predetermined before the ages for our glory.

None of the rulers of this age knew; for if they had known it, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory.

But, as it is written: "What eye has not seen, and ear has not heard, and what has not entered the human heart, what God has prepared for those who love him,"

--these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit. For the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human Except the human spirit that is within?

Similarly, no one knows what is truly God's except the Spirit of God.

REFLECTION

Let us reflect in silence on the psalm and Scripture we have heard today. After a time, consider these questions:

What are your thoughts about the changes facing our parish and its people?

Consider how you would complete this sentence: Concerning the changes faced by this parish, "I feel..."

After taking this time to reflect on your feelings, if you wish, share with the group or the person next to you. If sharing as a large group, sing/pray a refrain or antiphon after every few statements. Try to focus on your feelings and emotions, rather than actions.

SUNG/SPOKEN RESPONSE: Healer of Our Every III (Haugen/GIA) [or choose an alternative from your hymnal]

THE LORD'S PRAYER (please stand)

So often we cannot find the right words, so now we turn to words we know by heart, the words our Savior taught us:

R/. Our Father...

CLOSING PRAYER

O God,

you hear our inmost thoughts and know the needs of our hearts. In the midst of complex emotions, we turn to you in prayer.

Hear us, O God, in our uncertainty and doubt, in our fear and in our anger. If anger rises up, help us to rely on you.

Guide us with the wisdom to see new paths of possibility and the vision to move forward. Give us the strength to be unafraid of what is new.

We ask this through Christ our Lord. **R/. Amen.**

BLESSING

(Lead by a priest or deacon)

May the Lord bless you all, the Father, and the Son + and the Holy Spirit. (Lead by a layperson)

May the Lord bless us, protect us from evil and bring us to the joy of everlasting life.

R/. Amen.

Let us conclude our prayer with a sign of peace. *All exchange a sign of peace.*





A Prayer Service for Healing

SONG: Open My Eyes (Manibussan/OCP) [or Gather Your People (Hurd/OCP) Lead Me, Guide Me (GIA), Be Thou My Vision (SLANE)]

Leader: May the grace and hope of Jesus Christ be with you.

All: And with your spirit.

Leader: Welcome. It is good that we come together in our common trust of our God in heaven. We gather today, not out of desperation, as if, "Well, nothing has worked so far, so let's pray to God for a miracle." No. God has been part of this journey all along. We are here to pray because God hears and answers prayer. Praying for healing is part of that. Praying for God's daily strength, peace, and blessing is also part of that.

We come here in hope, which as we read in Hebrews 6:19, is "an anchor for the soul, firm and secure." Even when actions do not bring about a desired result, we still have hope. Our hope is not in human abilities or promises. Our hope is in God.

Leader: We bring our prayer requests to our loving Father, as children in need of a home. We long to ask for strength to open our eyes, our ears, and our hearts to the needs of the people of our diocese, and especially to the people in our local community.

Reader: Our response is, "Hear us, O Lord."

That we may be agents of healing in a time of pain, willing to consider the needs of others beyond our own, we pray ...

R/. Hear us, O Lord.

That priests may receive the support they need to carry out their mission to teach, govern, and make holy, we pray ...

R/. Hear us, O Lord.

That children may learn from their elders that change does not mean death, but rather the breath of life that brings about growth and transformation, we pray...

R/. Hear us, O Lord.

That we may open our eyes to the presence of God in each person we encounter along this journey, we pray ...

R/. Hear us, O Lord.

That we may open our ears to the message of hope ever before us, and the whisper of the Spirit at work in our midst, we pray ...

R/. Hear us, O Lord.

That we may open our hearts to feel gratitude for what we have had and anticipation for what lies before us, we pray ...

R/. Hear us, O Lord.

Leader: God of mercy,

we plead for your gentle touch on our lives in this time of change. Help us in our words and actions to honor those who have gone before us, those who helped build your kingdom here in our community. Let us embody their faith and perseverance as we broaden our reach to the greater world around us. We ask this through Christ, our Lord,

REFLECTION

If time allows, the attached reflection may be read, followed by a time of silence and then the questions. The reflection text consists of two parts which may be read individually (top to bottom,) or alternating from left to right.

- Consider how this transition is like other life changes: college or military service, marriage, loss of a parent.
- Consider how this transition is like other changes in the community: a new pastor, the creation of a new church. What helps you manage those transitions?
- What might help in this situation for the community or for you?

SUNG/SPOKEN RESPONSE: Increase our Faith (Haas/GIA) [or Center of My Life (Inwood/OCP)]

(Ask individual participants to read invocations.)

Leader: Filled with faith, energized by the power of God's love, and united by the mission to proclaim the Good News, we pray for the needs of the Church.

R/. God of mercy, hear our prayer (recited or sung) God of Mercy, Hear Our Prayer, Hurd/OCP)

Reader: For Bishop Persico and all those prayerfully guiding this process to unite our parishes and strengthen the People of God in the Erie Diocese, that they may be blessed with discerning hearts, pastoral wisdom and deep humility in their efforts, we pray ... **R**/.

For the lay men and women who serve our parishes, that the richness, diversity, and gifts of each person will be honored and employed, we pray \dots **R**/.

For those struggling with the prospect of change, that they may see through their difficulty to the possibility of renewal, not as a threat to what has been, but as an invitation to what can be, we pray $\dots \mathbf{R}/$.

For those who fear the loss of their Catholic identity, that they may be inspired to greater involvement in extending the Church's firm foundation in new and unexpected ways, we pray $\dots R$.

For each of us who make up the Church of the Diocese of Erie, that we may be empowered in this time of transition to share our voices in honest, constructive and respectful ways and to listen with open hearts and minds, we pray ... **R**/.

For those parishes facing immediate changes, especially ______ (church names), that we may be sources of support, compassion and encouragement in this time of transition, we pray $\dots \mathbf{R}/$.

- *Leader:* Loving God, you give us more than we can ever imagine or ask for, even when we do not readily recognize your presence. Help us to be genuine in our self-reflection, tireless in our commitment, patient in our discernment, loving in our communion, imaginative about our future, and daring in our faith. We pray all these things through Christ Our Lord.
 - All: Amen.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Leader: Let us pray as our Savior taught us: Our Father...

CLOSING PRAYER

All: We are your people, Lord, the flock you have called. Accept us, even in our weakness, our brokenness, our need to know, to manage, to save ourselves. Now in new and uncomfortable surrender, we hand over to you our planning for the next seasons of our lives. Show us the way through these transitions - of age and stage, of place and of past experiences, of finances and health, of ministries and communities. Shepherd us beyond our wants, beyond our fears. And guide us to pastures, to dwelling places, rich and verdant beyond our imagination.

BLESSING

- *Leader:* (making the sign of the cross) May the love of God embrace us, the obedience of Christ empty us, and the will of the Spirit embolden us as we journey together to the kingdom. Amen.

OPENING PRAYER

Leader: In times of change and stress, God's love is constant and consoling. Even when we feel abandoned, God loves us. The promise of eternal life is invisible, yet we believe. We gather together to celebrate God's faithfulness to us and to seek ways to show our faithfulness to God. Hear us, O God, as we unite ourselves to you. Increase in us our faithfulness.

SCRIPTURE (Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19) (please stand)

Notes to the reader from LTP's <u>Workbook for Lectors, Gospel Readers, and Proclaimers of the Word 2016</u>: "The author speaks of faith that stands firm despite many trials, including the trial of God's seeming silence... Faith enabled them to 'see' with their mind's eye and with their hearts what God had promised but was not yet." Please read slowly so the allusions are clear to the listeners. Emphasize the refrain "by Faith."

A reading from Paul's letter to the Hebrews:

Brothers and sisters: Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen. Because of it the ancients were well attested.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to go out to a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; he went out, not knowing where he was to go.

By faith he sojourned in the promised land as in a foreign country, dwelling in tents with Isaac and Jacob, heirs of the same promise; for he was looking forward to the city with foundations whose architect and maker is God.

<u>By faith</u> he received power to generate, even though he was past the normal age – and Sarah herself was sterile – for he thought that the one who had made the promise was trustworthy.

So it was that there came forth from one man, himself as good as dead, descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and countless as the sands on the seashore.

All these died in faith. They did not receive what had been promised but saw it and greeted it from afar and acknowledged themselves to be strangers and aliens on earth, for those who speak thus show that they are seeking a homeland.

If they had been thinking of the land from which they had come, they would have had opportunity to return. But now they desire a better homeland, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared a city for them.

By faith Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac, and he who had received the promises was ready to offer his only son, of whom it was said, "Through Isaac, descendants shall bear your name." He reasoned that God was able to raise even from the dead, and he received Isaac back as a symbol.

The Word of the Lord.

R/. Thanks be to God.

REFLECTION

In this reading, we witness Abraham's faithfulness and his belief that God would fulfill his promises of countless descendants and the city of God. Hebrews 11:6 says: "But without faith it is impossible to please him, for anyone who approaches God must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who seek him."

Consider these questions in silence. Then discuss and share in small groups, or with the whole group. (10-15 mins)

- Q. Which of God's promises are most important to you? (Name God's promises first. Then answer the second question for each promise.)
- Q. What does each promise require of you?
- **SONG:** City of God (Schutte/OCP [or Lord of All Hopefulness (SLANE), or another appropriate song]

INTERCESSIONS (please stand)

- *Leader:* In hope and trust, we bring our needs to the Lord.
- *Reader:* That those who shape your church may be guided by faith, wisdom and hope, we pray to the Lord...**R**/.

That the hearts and mouths of the faithful might be opened to participate fully in worshipping you, we pray to the Lord...R.

That we may be thankful for the faithfulness God has shown to his people, we pray to the Lord...R/.

That we may grow in the strength to believe in the fulfillment of God's promises, we pray to the Lord...**R**/.

That we may believe God loves us always and that we are worthy of God's love, we pray to the Lord...**R**/.

- *Leader:* Loving God, you gave Isaac back to Abraham, but sacrificed your Son for us. Help us to live each day sacrificing for others. We ask this through Christ our Lord.
- All: Amen.

CLOSING PRAYER

Leader: Faithful God, we dream because you have given us vision, faith, hope and love. Without you, our dreams are worthless and our hopes empty. Sustain us with your love and renew us with your grace. We are men and women of faith and depend totally on you. Amen.

BLESSING

(Lead by a priest or deacon) May the Lord bless you all, the Father, and the Son + and the Holy Spirit. (Lead by a layperson)

May the Lord bless us, protect us from evil and bring us to the joy of everlasting life.

R/. Amen.

INTRODUCTION

"What eye has not seen, and ear has not heard, and what has not entered the human heart, what God has prepared for those who love him," this God has revealed to us through the Spirit.

For the Spirit scrutinizes everything, even the depths of God. Among human beings, who knows what pertains to a person except the spirit of the person that is within? Similarly, no one knows what pertains to God except the Spirit of God. We have not received the spirit of the world but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the things freely given us by God. And we speak about them not with words taught by human wisdom, but with words taught by the Spirit, describing spiritual realities in spiritual terms.
