A Ministry of Presence...

>>> **Two decades ago,** our church, recognizing the powerful witness uniquely available through women religious, established an outreach in rural areas of our diocese.

Women religious responded "yes" to this call to be out among the people and are still serving to this day.

This fall marks the 20th anniversary of rural ministry throughout the Bradford Deanery of the Diocese of Erie. Known as Catholic Rural Ministry, Sisters Phyllis Schleicher, OSB, and Mary Hoffman, OSB, have been and continue to be a compassionate presence for the people.

Their presence consoles families who are grieving and comforts those who are sick or homebound. Sisters Phyllis and Mary support parish staff and ministries. With a total of 13 parishes and missions in McKean and Potter counties, their presence has a large impact. With assistance from Catholic Charities grant monies, they

also aid those who are experiencing an emergency need and help them to obtain clothing, food, furniture or financial assistance. Spiritual guidance, faith sharing and prayer is offered for all in need. Sister Phyllis says, "just today we received a message on our phone from a family – wife, husband and son

who rely on food stamps and have a limited income. The husband has an important surgery coming up in Pittsburgh and asked if we could help provide them with a gas card to help get them to this necessary surgery."

The Sisters responded "yes." They were able to meet this request with funding assistance from Catholic Charities, Inc.

Sister Mary says their work in this community is important because through them, people see the presence of women religious.

>>> The Holy Spirit guided Catholic Rural Ministry to the 16 parishes and mission churches of the Oil City Deanery in 2007. Today, Sister Marian Wehler, OSB, and Sister Tina Geiger, RSM, serve people in need in Venango, Clarion, and parts of Crawford and Forest counties.

Called to be women of hope and a presence to these regions, the sisters say, "we are in this area for you. If there is any need, you can come to us." And the people do. Their activities include adult and youth faith enrichment such as retreats, bible studies and reflection days with various parish groups.

Some rural parishes never had a woman religious in their parish, so the sisters' presence helps to witness to women's call to leadership in the church. Education and engaging with youth are some of their greatest joys.

Being instruments of God's compassionate care is vital in today's world. Thus, sisters are also involved in Mustard Seed Ministries, serving Venango County. Ecumenical in nature, together church volunteers help to repair unsafe housing for people in need, and CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE



Michael Bailey, a member of St. Luke Parish in Erie, was honored as the 2019 Catholic Charities' Helping Hands Award honoree, recognized for his outstanding commitment to church and community.

A master gardener, Michael has been instrumental in the development of local gardens that provide fresh produce, including Emmaus Grove, SBEC Garden and the gardens at St. Luke Parish and at Pfeiffer-Burleigh School.

A sixth-grade religious education teacher for 10 years at St. Luke, he coordinates service hours for students in the confirmation pro-

gram. He oversees the parish's participation in St. Martin Center's Shining Star Christmas gift program and the gift distribution to all participating families. Michael, along with other St. Luke parishioners, offers a weekly Communion service at LECOM Senior Living Center.

Club CC Night attendees learned that 25,723 persons received a total of 34,611 services through Catholic Charities' agencies and ministries in 13 counties in the Diocese of Erie last year alone. Bishop Lawrence Persico called out the important work of Catholic Charities in his opening remarks:

"The people who work in our agencies have first-hand experience helping parents who know what it's like to forego dinner so their child can have something to eat," he said. "They have had the privilege of helping a man find suitable clothing for a job interview he might not otherwise be able to accept. And they know what it's like to work with a single mom on the verge of homelessness, providing her not only with housing, but also with months of education that will help her get on her feet, grow in confidence and establish a better life for herself and her children."

>>> DIRECTLY TO CATHOLIC CHARITIES IRA CHARITABLE ROLLOVER

If you are 70½ years old or older, you can transfer up to \$100,000 from your IRA directly to Catholic Charities as a qualified charity without having to pay income taxes on the money. This giving option allows you to support our mission and ministries.

You pay no income taxes on your gift. The transfer generates neither taxable income nor a tax deduction, so you benefit even if you do not itemize your deductions. If you have not yet taken your required minimum distribution for the year, your IRA charitable rollover gift to Catholic Charities can satisfy all or part of that requirement.
