Later, you may want to travel through the countryside and meet the volunteers who distribute hundreds of bags of food to neighbors each month at St. Elizabeth Center in Oil City. Their compassion and work ethic are second to none. And while you're at it, go a little further east

and stop by Christ the King Manor, the second of our elder-care facilities and meet more healthcare heroes offering extraordinary care to hundreds of residents who call the manor their home.



A few more miles east and you'll arrive in the beautiful town of Clearfield, where the Good Samaritan Center rests peacefully among lovely homes and buildings, providing a clean and welcome place to stay for men who currently have no home.

Back north, stop by St. Martin Center on Erie's east side where they showcase a 5-star Early Learning Center, a food pantry and other social services, while

Catholic Charities Counseling and Adoption Services on the west side (with satellite offices in many locations) demonstrates gospel values through its counseling, adoption and refugee resettlement programs.

And speaking of those many hands, I want to thank everyone who volunteers on our various boards and committees, serving

A focus on...Parish tithing and agency grants

Parish tithing

Catholic Charities, Inc. recently received generous donations from two parishes and their pastors: Fr. Larry Richards and his



parishioners from St. Joseph/Bread of Life Community Parish and Fr. John Detisch and his parishioners at St. Jude Parish. Each community chose to tithe their fundraising proceeds as a way to support the good work that is done by Catholic Charities in and around our 13 counties of the Diocese of Frie.

Fr. Richards strongly believes that tithing is a way to "give to God what belongs to God first," and he shows

that by taking care of those in need through their food pantry and clothing store as well as their involvement with the overflow shelter. Additionally, the top 10 percent of all their fundraising proceeds is automatically donated to a single charity or a group of charities, regardless of faith.

Fr. Richards often asks himself and others, "If your parish were to close today, would anyone notice besides your parishioners? If not, then have you truly done your job?" Accountability to these words helps drive his commitment to tithing.

So, what is tithing? Tithing means setting aside a certain amount of one's income for God, as shown in the first book of the Bible. In Genesis, Adam and Eve's children brought portions of their



flocks and first crops to the Lord in order to thank him for a successful harvest.

The parishioners at St. Jude the Apostle Parish along with their pastor, Fr. John Detisch, also embrace tithing as a way to thank God for their own successful "harvest."

They did so by graciously donating a portion of their annual car raffle proceeds to Catholic Charities, Inc. Inspired by the teaching and

example of Jesus Christ, Fr. Detisch and his parishioners truly felt the call to give back.

Fr. Detisch says, "Catholic Charites is the arm and bloodline to the people in need in and around our community." Since early in his priesthood, Fr. Detisch remembers always thinking of Catholic Charities as the place to go or to refer people who reached out to him for help. He is honored "to aid the countless, nameless people that Catholic Charities provides services to each and every day."

Helping Hands honorees

For many years, the Brogdons have been the helping hands to many people in the Erie area affected by homelessness, poverty and illness. They've ministered to refugees and the elderly and have been active in parish life as eucharistic ministers and religious educators.

Deacon Dick and Victoria are actively involved in "Our Neighbors' Place," an overflow homeless shelter. The couple has collaborated with Catholic Charities Counseling and Adoption Services by

assisting Erie's growing refugee population. They also volunteer with ServErie.

Additionally, special recognition was given to those who donated to the COVID-19 Emergency Relief Fund for Catholic Charities. Letters and certificates were sent to these individuals and businesses for their generous donations during these extraordinary times.

The impact of Catholic Charities affiliates and agencies

Helping Hands Gala attendees learned that 26,519 persons received at least one and sometimes more services through Catholic Charities' agencies and ministries in the 13 counties of the Diocese of Erie last year alone. Bishop Lawrence Persico underscored the important work of Catholic Charities in his opening remarks:

"Because of the work of Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Erie, over 20,000 hungry people were fed last year. That is nearly triple from

two years ago," he said. "Nearly 4,000 people were given clothing they needed and another 9,000 received some type of emergency assistance, which also is nearly double what we did in 2019. The men and women who work in our agencies have first-hand experience encountering those in especially challenging situations." He added, "They know what it's like to work with a single mom on the verge of homelessness, providing her not only with housing, but also with counseling and instruction that will help her get on her feet, grow in confidence and establish a better life for herself and her children."
