Pope Francis to meet Trump at Vatican May 24



WASHINGTON (CNS)—President Donald Trump will visit the Vatican and meet with Pope Francis May 24 as part of his first foreign trip as president.

White House officials said the visit will be part of a trip that will include stops in Israel and Saudi Arabia before Trump attends a NATO meeting in Brussels May 25.

Trump also will attend the G7 summit in Taormina on the island of Sicily May 26-27.

The trip is an attempt to unite three of the world's leading religious faiths in the common cause of fighting terrorism, White House officials said May 4.

Officials said it also is intended to rein in Iran and unify "the world against intolerance."

The information was confirmed by Paloma Garcia Ovejero, vice director of the Vatican press office.

The president's meeting with Pope Francis is to take place in the Apostolic Palace and will include Cardinal Pietro Parolin, Vatican secretary of state, and Archbishop Paul Gallagher, secretary for relations with states.

Trump said at an April 20 news conference with Italian Prime Minister Paolo Gentiloni that he was interested in meeting with the pope.

Four men to be ordained permanent deacons

Four men will be ordained to the permanent diaconate May 26 during a ceremony at St. Peter Cathedral in downtown Erie.

The deacon candidates are:

- **Kevin Harmon** of St. Titus Parish, Titusville
- **Gerald Peterson** of Our Lady of Peace Parish, Erie
- **Daniel Satterlee** of Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Sykesville
- **Joseph Yochim** of Our Lady of Peace Parish, Erie.

Bishop Lawrence Persico will officiate at the ordination ceremony, which begins at 7 p.m.

In the Catholic Church, the diaconate is the first of three ranks in ordained ministry. Deacons preparing for the priesthood are transitional deacons.

Those not planning to be ordained priests are called permanent deacons. Married men may be ordained permanent deacons, and single men may be ordained to the permanent diaconate with a commitment to celibacy.

Religious leaders react to Trump order

WASHINGTON—Many religious leaders viewed President Donald Trump's May 4 executive order on religious freedom as a step in the right direction.

In a ceremony for the National Day of Prayer prior to signing the executive order, Trump told the assembled religious leaders: "We're taking big steps to protect religious liberty" and he assured them the government "won't stand for religious discrimination."

Three religious leaders, including Washington Cardinal Donald W. Wuerl, offered

prayers during a Rose Garden ceremony. Just prior to the event, Cardinal Wuerl and Cardinal Daniel N. DiNardo of Galveston-Houston, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, met with Trump about the order.

Erie Bishop Lawrence Persico reiterated a comment made by Cardinal DiNardo that U.S. bishops will "have to review the details of any regulatory proposals" as a result of the executive order. In an interview with Catholic News Service at Reagan National Airport just after the White House ceremony, Cardinal DiNardo said the meeting with the president was brief

but productive.

The cardinal said the executive order "begins the process of alleviating the serious burden of the HHS mandate," referring to the mandate issued by the federal Department of Health and Human Services requiring most religious employers to provide

coverage of artificial birth control for their employees even if they morally oppose it. The Diocese of Erie is among many religious entities that have opposed the mandate, litigating it all the way to the U.S. Su-

"We are many parts, we are all one body, and the gifts we have we are given to share."

If you've been singing in church since the 1980s, you'll most likely be able to finish this refrain from the popular liturgical song, "We Are Many Parts," written by Marty Haugen.

It ends: "May the spirit of love make us one indeed, one, the love that we share, one, our hope in despair, one, the cross that we bear."

Love, hope and the cross represent the Christian journey lived out by the late Mark Kulyk, a longtime musical leader and parishioner at Holy Cross Church in Fairview. His love of Hau-

gen's music, and that of two other renowned liturgical musicians—David Haas and Stephen Petrunak—will be shared at a concert featuring the three men May 19 at 7:30 p.m. at Holy Cross.

Before his death to brain cancer last November, Kulyk, 60, had challenged Kathy Felong, the parish music director, to organize a concert featuring Haugen, Haas and Petrunak. He had long wanted to see the three men perform together, given their important contributions to liturgical music in Catholic churches over the past three decades.

Felong knows Haugen, Haas and Petrunak through her involvement in the National Association for Pastoral Musicians (NPM) since the early 1990s. She has sung in concerts by Haas and

Haugen and co-authored with Petrunak a series of method books for church guitarists. Petrunak is the newly named president of NPM.

Surprisingly, all three were able to accommodate their schedules and commit to the upcoming concert. More than 300 tickets have been sold so far; tickets also are sale for a pre-concert reception with the musicians.

"I think Mark would be thrilled to see the response of the people, knowing what a gift of faith the concert will be," Felong says.

Haas, Haugen and Petrunak did not know Mark Kulyk personally, but their





'Pedaling priests' complete bicycle trek

PEORIA, Ill. (CNS)—Father Michael Pica, Father Tom Otto and Father Adam Cesarek dip their rear tires in the Mississippi River April 24 as they begin "Priests Pedaling for Prayers."

The effort to raise awareness of vocations took them more than 340 miles from the border between Iowa and Illinois to the Indiana state line four days later. "It does seem a little surreal," Father Tom Otto said at the journey's end. "Things like this seem insurmountable when you begin, but maybe like life, you focus on the short-term goals ... That makes it doable. Take one little bit at a time and before you know it, you've done something pretty incredible."

■ Pope plans celebrations with charismatics and Pentecostals

VATICAN CITY (CNS)—Pope Francis has invited thousands of Catholic charismatics and members of Pentecostal and Evangelical churches to Rome to celebrate Pentecost and mark the 50th anniversary of what became the Catholic Charismatic Renewal.

The pope will lead a prayer vigil June 3, the eve of Pentecost, at Rome's Circus Maximus, an open field that was the site of an ancient Roman stadium used for chariot races. Participants will join the pope the next morning for Pentecost Mass in St. Peter's Square.

In 2014, Pope Francis had invited charismatics and Pentecostals to Rome in 2017 to mark the 50th anniversary of the Catholic charismatic movement, which traces its origins to a retreat held in 1967 at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh. The anniversary event is being organized by the Vatican-based International Catholic Charismatic Renewal Services.

The jubilee celebrations will begin in Rome May 31 with prayer meetings, a youth festival, meetings for theologians and workshops.

The Catholic Charismatic Renewal is present in more than 200 countries and has reached an estimated 120 million Catholics.

■ Papal trip termed 'big blessing' for Christian, Muslim Egyptians

AMMAN, Jordan (CNS)—Pope Francis' historic, 72-hour visit to Cairo last month has left a profound mark on Egyptians, Catholic leaders said, as they anticipate increased ties with fellow Orthodox Christians and Muslims.

"The pope's visit was a big blessing to the Egyptians, both Muslims and Christians. It

boosted the morale of the Egyptian people, especially after the Palm Sunday blasts," Father Rafic Greiche, spokesman for the Egyptian bishops, told Catholic News Service by phone. "He gave a message of love, peace and hope."

Father Greiche referred to a pair of terrorist attacks April 9 at two Egyptian churches. The Islamic State group claimed responsibility for the attacks, which killed at least 45 people, injured more than 100 others and shook the Middle East's largest Christian community to the core. "The pope's visit for Catholics in Egypt was a great happening, very positive," said Jesuit Father Samir Khalil Samir, a noted Egyptian Catholic theologian and Islamic studies scholar. The professor teaches at the Pontifical Oriental Institute in Rome and St. Joseph's University in Beirut.

Even more important, he said, was the historic improvement in ecumenical ties between the Catholic and the Coptic Orthodox churches. Pope Francis and Coptic Orthodox Pope Tawadros II signed a declaration on common baptism.

■ Catholic leaders urge Israel to meet strikers' demands

JERUSALEM (CNS)—Catholic leaders in the Holy Land urged Israel to concede to demands of Palestinian political prisoners on a hunger strike since April 17.

The prisoners are seeking an improvement in their prison conditions and an end to administrative detention, which allows Israel to hold prisoners almost indefinitely without having to charge them with a crime.

The Assembly of Catholic Ordinaries of the Holy Land said the prisoners are asking that their human rights and dignity be respected according to international law and the Geneva Convention.

music deeply touched him, says his wife, Joyce Kulyk. The couple worked for 25 years with Worldwide Marriage Encounter.

"When their music came out, it was the new post-Vatican II sound," Joyce Kulyk says.

"The psalms they chose for their music were very singable and their words were more relatable to the liturgy and the Gospels. Mark had a positive feeling that it drew together the congregation. It was a unifying kind of feeling."

In a recent telephone conference call, Haugen, Haas and Petrunak told *FaithLife* that music ministry is about sharing gifts, believing that through their songs people in the pews are moved to action in their own faith. For Haas, it's "humbling."

"We are servants. We

trust that the Spirit will do its work," says Haas, who has produced more than 50 collections of original music, including such songs as "We Have Been Told" and "Blest Are They."

For Haugen, music is a shared language that Mark Kulyk obviously

spoke as well. "People still feel connected to our music," Haugen says. "Music comes at a time in our deepest moments." Petrunak's recordings are available through

"We're coming to honor a person's life who sounds like an amazing man to his family and to his faith community," Petrunak says.

preme Court. The outcome of that case still has not been determined.

The text of the executive order, "Promoting Free Speech and Religious Liberty," states that cabinet offices "shall consider issuing amended regulations, consistent with applicable law, to address conscience-based objections to the preventive-care mandate."

During the White House ceremony, Trump told some of the Little Sisters of the Poor in the crowd: "Your long ordeal will soon be over." The sisters are just one of the groups that challenged the federal contraceptive mandate.

Mother Loraine Marie Maguire, superior of the Little Sisters' Baltimore province, said in a statement that the sisters are "grateful for the president's order and look forward to the agencies giving us an exemption so that we can continue caring for the elderly poor and dying" without fear of government punishment.

Another aspect of the order is a weakening of the Johnson Amendment, the 1954 amendment that bans churches and nonprofit organizations of all types from participating in partisan political activity at the risk of losing their tax-exempt status.

Trump told the religious leaders that the order's attempt to lessen restrictions of the amendment will

be "giving our churches their voices back."

The order states the Treasury Department shall ensure and "respect and protect the freedom of persons and organizations to engage in religious and political speech."

It also calls for department officials to "not take any adverse action against any individual, house of worship, or other religious organization" for speaking about moral or political issues from a religious perspective.

Regarding religious liberty, the order is not very specific. It states: "In order to guide all agencies in complying with relevant federal law, the attorney general shall, as appropriate, issue guidance interpreting religious liberty protections in federal law."

Cardinal DiNardo told CNS that the executive order emphasizes that there should "not be an overly intrusive federal government" involved when a person or group is exercising one's faith.

Catholic Foundation offers students Code-a-Pillars

OIL CITY—St. Stephen School in Oil City was one of several schools in the Diocese of Erie to receive the Fisher-Price Code-a-Pillar to develop such skills as curiosity, experimentation and problem-solving. A grant from the Catholic Foundation made the purchase of the tools possible.

The Code-a-Pillar assists young learners in the first stages of learning coding, a technology skill taught in many middle-school technology classes. By connecting segments of the Code-a-Pillar using codes or instructions, students move the caterpillar-like robot along a specified path.
