Description:	Within the family home, sometimes referred to as the Domestic Church, the parent(s) / guardian(s) are responsible for the weekly completion of a session with the child(ren) using material provided by the parish. This process of prayer, shared lesson and family learning provides an opportunity for the parent(s) / guardian(s) to understand and fulfill the role of "primary educators of the faith." The parish religious education program offers support and meetings (bi-monthly or monthly) that provide a faith formation experience for the adult with a topic that assists in the overseeing of the faith formation of the child (ren) in the home.

Alternative Model Type:	Family Centered
Considerations:	Parish has a religious education leader / pastor with the knowledge, communication skills and time to lead the monthly / bi-monthly topical meetings for formation of the adults. These meetings focus principally on preparing the adults to teach the next section of the chosen material and should include information concerning both content and process. (forming adults to form their children)
• Variations: •	All sessions are completed <b>in the home</b> ; parent(s)/ guardian(s) attend the monthly / bi-monthly meetings to prepare for home sessions and special/seasonal events. Students attend with their parent(s)/guardian(s) and are divided into multiple grade groups; with sessions completed by a catechist, either monthly – every other week at the parish; home lessons are completed on the opposite weeks. Students taught by their parents participate in monthly/bi- monthly sessions as a family unit, with catechists guiding the process
Principle Educational Audience:	The focus is typically on those families in the parish who have school age children. It begins in the recognition that children must be formed both in the home and the parish and that the two must collaborate in the formation of disciples.
