CHOCOLATE: CRAVING OR TEMPTATION? - By Kathy Wilcox

Craving carbs, especially chocolate is a constant struggle for me, but I never considered it as actually a spiritual battle.

Ash Wednesday several years ago brought the issue into focus. I am excused from the strictest fasting rules because of my age, but I was determined to follow the simple rule of no meat, one full meal, and two smaller meals. Easy, right? I love cheese and fish so the meals were no problem. The issue for me was/is snacks. This particular day there was a small portion of chocolate ice cream still in my freezer. My husband surprised me with a carton of chocolate ice cream and there was about ½ cup left in the freezer. Temptation? Yes!!!! *All I could think of was that ice cream.* I was not hungry, I was *obsessed*.

"Chocolate, CHOCOLATE," it screamed at me! I tried to distract myself, reading a book and watching TV. Still, the ice cream was a picture in my mind that I could see with my eyes closed. I should have prayed but the craving had taken over. *Who will know?*" was my first thought (likely a suggestion from the devil). My husband does not understand fasting, so he will *not even notice* me eating the ice cream (another suggestion from that demon on my shoulder). I found myself watching the clock. *"I can wait it out. I will just wait until after midnight, and it will not be Ash Wednesday anymore"*.

The minutes ticked by slowly, and my hands were clenched into tight fists. My husband had gone to bed. Then the clock hands at last moved past midnight. Finally, it was not Ash Wednesday anymore. However, I abruptly realized that *I no longer wanted the ice cream*, so I went to bed. The next day, I still did not want the ice cream and the day after that. It was ultimately tossed out in its dried out carton. The battle was over, at least that one!

So how serious is temptation? Why should I worry about it? Well in this case

it was ice cream, but the reality is, we have a free will that needs to be disciplined, because temptation is the precursor of many serious sins, and this is how Satan weakens our wills. Matthew 15: 19 (NRSVCE) reminds us that *"For out of the heart come evil thoughts."* Satan? Yes.

It is easy to be fascinated by the demonic. The entertainment industry has successfully tapped into the market for movies and TV shows starring the devil and his crew. Séances, possessed children, haunted houses, and Halloween hatchet killers are all popular, and interest in witchcraft and the like are growing at a rate many of us never imagined possible. Satan is gearing up for his last battle. And he will use every means at his disposal, including technology, drugs/addictions, deceptions, some pharmaceuticals, and a whole host of other things. But in reality, he could not use anything or gain any ground without the use of us human beings and our precious gift of free will. At any given moment, our free will is either in line with God and serving Him, or it is in line with something other than God's will and serving Satan. Sound harsh? No. It's really that simple.

While we are warned against these things, most Christians are careful not to let themselves be drawn into overt involvement with demonic practices. Still Satan has demons working overtime, and his goal is always to wreak havoc and to drag us down the road to Hell. This is his only goal. Destroy every beautiful thing and relationship created by God and draw us away from the will of God.

Famous exorcist, Father Francois Demine said in a recent interview with Catholic News Agency, that "The greatest way the devil works is through temptation to commit evil, the most common manifestation of the demonic is temptation, which is much more significant than possession." He went on to caution, "We must not under value the significance of temptation. It's not as

spectacular as possession, but it's far more dangerous [to the soul]." Wow.

Those little temptations we avoid each day are eternally important to our spiritual growth and to our souls. Americans seem to have little ability to say "no" to any little thing our body or mind craves. This is a great battle in this country. There is no discipline over our senses or our desires. Satan knows this all too well and takes full advantage of it. Americans, even Christian Americans, are generally completely blind to how many idols we are serving. A hard truth when you start to examine it.

James 1:13 (NRSVCE)

"No one experiencing temptation should say, 'I am being tempted by God'; for God is not subject to temptation to evil, and he himself tempts no one."

The devil is the one who knows our weaknesses and tempts each person accordingly. For me it is chocolate. But when the Lord says, "No!" He means "No!" So, I will continue the war on my will against chocolate. Not because chocolate in itself is bad, but because God has asked me to give up something difficult to share in his sufferings during Lent.

Maybe for you it is a sexual addiction, such as pornography, which exorcists note opens the doors to serious obsession and even possession. Or maybe there is an addiction to television when God didn't create us to sit in front of a box instead of serving Him. Going on... Maybe it is a television show that you rationalize as "not that bad," but really, in God's view, it is. Maybe there is addiction, or anger, or gossip, or detraction against someone's character. These things are serious. How do you take back the words spoken against a brother or a sister, or take back the effect of a prideful but incorrect opinion that you stated with such confidence under the guise of all kinds of excuses to justify damaging someone's character?

Are you living a miraculous life? Are you in touch with the supernatural? Are you living in the *orchestration of angels*? Christ did. Remember the desert?

Let's examine this point:

How Angels Orchestrate

Look at your life. Look at each day. You know how they can go: *One is smooth* beyond all expectation, with everything falling neatly into place; your timing is just right; what you are trying to do goes together without a hitch. All the gears mesh in whatever you're attempting, and people are treating you just right. That's a good day. We all have them. Hopefully, we thank God for them. Because they are supernatural. Believe that.

And then there are bad days — when you're all thumbs and when everything that *could* go wrong does. You're out of sync. There seems to be a gremlin throwing little wrenches into those gears. No one likes you (or at least, no one helps). It happens to all of us all of the time. And some of it is simply the flow of life: we are tested. Every day, our patience is examined by the Good Great Lord.

But there are ways we can enhance those "good" days and one is by making sure we are utilizing angels. That means prayer. It increases the likelihood that we will draw down God's blessing that day or in a particular endeavor. You know His angels are orchestrating things when a task is done and done well in half the time it usually takes, when there is this flow that seems to let you glide over a job that can often be taxing.

When mystics see angels, they describe holy entities guiding events and people around

us (what we consider good "luck"). You know those classic paintings that show angels playing instruments in an orchestra? They orchestrate. Look at the role they played in the discovery of Jesus' Resurrection. *And meditate this day on how very many times angels may have helped you and even saved your life. When we die, we'll see how many precarious situations they prevented or guided us through. And it will amaze us. A good day it is to thank them.*

As reported by Dr. Jeffrey Long in his new book, *Evidence of the Afterlife: The Science of Near-Death Experiences*, a man named Jonathan had a one percent chance of surviving surgery on his esophagus. We should say, he had a one percent chance when one did not count the intervention of angels!

"I remember standing about ten feet up and ten feet to the side of my body on the operating table," Jonathan recounted in this book that has been drawing national attention. "Around the table were at least a dozen nurses and doctors. *But what was so emotional was the presence of glowing people who I can only describe as angels.* Each angel was guiding the hands of the staff they were standing next to. I don't remember details too specific, such as what tools were used or the exact position of my body, but only because I was focused so much on the angels guiding the staff in everything they did, from walking to the use of the tools within my chest cavity. Even after the operation, I still had an unusual peace and no fear. The doctor said it was the best operation he had ever gone through — there were no problems at all — and he was impressed at

my rate of recovery."

When we have peace, when we "glow," when all seems so smooth, it is because angels hover around and over us. We "draw down God's blessing." Form your sanctuary; open it each morning with a Rosary (perhaps a Scriptural Rosary, or at this time of year, the Stations). Fast. Pray from the heart. Get closer to your guardian! There are plenty of angels around, especially during Mass, there for the asking.

"Whoever say's to his brother 'you fool' will be liable to fiery Gehenna." The sins of the tongue are so difficult to control. If we have done this, we need to make amends and attempt to repair the character damage we are responsible for. One of the strongest verses regarding how we conduct our speech in the Bible is:

*"I tell you on the day of judgment men will render account for every careless word they utter. **For by your words you are justified, and by your words you will be condemned.**"*

Mt 12:36-37, RSVCE

Sometimes we think we know everything. Pride. But God is the one who knows, and God is the one who judges. Without a doubt, one fruitful thing to practice this Lent is, not only control of our tongues, but also control of our self-righteous, prideful mental judgements of brothers and sisters. Satan always tries to divide and destroy the good that God has done.

It's the time of year to examine and become aware of our temptations (through the Holy Spirit) so that we can fight the minute to minute battle with our human will and develop one of the main things necessary for spiritual growth: DISCIPLINE of thought and action.

Jesus fasted for forty days — a day for each year ancient Jews themselves spent on the desert. Only with prayer and fasting — as Jesus said — can Satan be cast out. Jesus also used scripture to reject Satan's temptations when Satan twisted scripture to justify sin.

What is the best way to handle temptation? Pray, read scripture, and fast, just like Jesus did. When temptations come, have a short scripture handy in order to proclaim it, such as "get behind me, Satan!" Ask for grace in the moments that you need it. God does not abandon us. But He does permit the battle for the growth of our own sanctity and holiness.

TAKE EVERY THOUGHT CAPTIVE By Jaci Phillips-Sabol

This article is a testimony of an experience I had during Lent several years ago.

I was completing a two-year post-doctoral degree Fellowship in the Neurology Department of the University of Alabama at Birmingham Medical Center (UAB). God was so good in arranging this fellowship for me. I loved Birmingham. I love the heat! I loved the hills and the flowers. I loved the deep South and the people of the deep South. Granted I never became adept at discerning when *"Bless yer hearrrrrrt"* really meant 'Bless your heart,' versus when *"Bless yer hearrrrrrt"* meant something to the effect of "you poor little Yankee who doesn't know the first thing about how to conduct yourself as fine Southern lady, etc., . . ." (indeed I did not). But I did love Birmingham.

I thrived on the level of education at UAB and sopped it up like a sponge. I loved all the physicians I worked with who were always willing to recognize my need for detailed explanations related to neurological and medical disorders. I remembered these things easily. God made my brain to love everything about medicine and how the brain functions. When I see the brain, I see God through it. So... What did I not love? It's kind of a mixed bag. I loved my mentor/primary supervisor who was JD (Juris Doctor, aka, lawyer), as well as a PhD (Doctor of Philosophy in Neuropsychology). In short, he was a "JD, PhD." Before he was a neuropsychologist, he was a lawyer. And not just a lawyer, but a lawyer who taught *legal writing* to other lawyers.

It was such a wonderful experience because, under his direction, I learned how to evaluate cases with highly complex legal and/or medical issues. He was absolutely artful in the way he approached and managed these cases. Watching him be deposed and observing his graceful, unflappable, deliberate, and well thought out responses is a lesson and imagine I still carry with me. Nonetheless, this mentor had extremely high standards for case formulation and report writing. Neuropsychology reports are highly complex. They summarize testing of every major function of the brain, taking into consideration normal patterns of disorders in addition to personality and emotional factors. Neuropsychological reports within this fellowship ranged from 12 to sometimes over 30 pages.

When I started this fellowship, I prided myself on good writing skills. Written communication was a strength. UNTIL I REACHED FELLOWSHIP. My first reports edited by my mentor came back to me looking as if he had a *red pen seizure* all over my reports. I was quite disheartened. I had done my best. But I dutifully worked to address all the *red pen issues* he found in my reports. Then came my next surprise ... They came back with a second round (and

sometimes a third) of new red pen marks for me to address. It wasn't long before I couldn't keep up with writing reports for new patients while editing previous reports 2 and 3 (ok, occasionally 4) times. I had two stacks of patient folders to finish that were literally as tall as my desk and I felt hopeless to dig myself out. I worked every free minute of every day. As soon as I got home, I edited. On the weekends, I edited. When I had no-show patients, I edited.

So, there I was within my prestigious fellowship, feeling as if I was completely failing. *And here is where the enemy came in...* There was a faculty member who was a former Fellow under the same mentor. And the outgoing Fellow I was replacing could not get out fast enough and expressed his extreme unhappiness regarding my mentor to me - *an excited and hopeful new incoming fellow*. People were definitely aware of my Mentor's reputation for being extremely detail oriented and demanding when it came to report writing. They began to take me aside to express their negative opinions of my mentor. They *'sided'* with me if I expressed my frustration. It was not long before negative thoughts and anger related to the *unfairness* of my mentor's expectations were literally consuming my thoughts as I fought to keep up. I even started to have dreams about it!

Then Lent arrived. Even though I didn't think I was wrong, I did recognize that these negative interactions with people and negative thoughts were not Godly at all. I made a dramatic resolution during Lent to, not only not entertain any negative verbal opinions people gave about my mentor, but I also resolved to *not even think* negative thoughts about him. To be honest, I didn't think I could do it. But I knew I was going to try my best.

I found myself in a literal second to second battle against the thoughts that consumed me. I made a definitive decision to either graciously depart from the negative conversations or comment on a positive attribute of my mentor, which were honestly too many to count. It was a difficult battle and it was apparent that the temptations were entering my mind by me entertaining them and were also being brought through other people. But I fought the battle. By the end of Lent, I was free of the obsessive negative thoughts. My reward was the ability to receive a blessing God had planned for me all along; but, until that Lent, I was cooperating with the devil to destroy that blessing.

I became aware of the most amazing gift as a result of taking up this battle during Lent. As I said, by the end of Lent I no longer had any negative thoughts regarding my wonderful mentor. He wasn't the one who was wrong. **I WAS WRONG!** After this battle, if anyone said anything negative about him, it bounced right off me and I did not allow it to enter my mind. As a result, I was now much more able to learn from this incredibly bright and gifted mentor. My learning went on fast forward. I

learned more than I could have ever dreamt possible. I was able to receive his feedback without the previous defensiveness I had built up. I recognized that this man was taking me from where I was and was always calling me and challenging me to the next higher level while being there to support me in reaching it. To this day, so many years later, whenever I write (and even as I am writing this) I find myself in the habit of wondering how Dan would react or what he would change.

One of my proudest moments came when, after my fellowship ended and I began my first faculty position in a hospital, the head of that program shared Dan's letter of recommendation with me. He wanted me to see that Dan had given me incredibly honored praise in his letter. I was shocked and overwhelmed. To this day, the moment I read his comment reflects one of my most hard-won and genuinely proud moments (not proud in a bad way).

God had a blessing in store for me. I almost missed it. Learn from my errors. From my SIN. I almost blew it by allowing the devil to build a nest of negative obsessive thoughts in my head and by blaming my mentor for 'being too hard on me' rather than pointing the finger at myself from the start to call myself to rise to the challenge my mentor was calling me to. Not to mention the challenge to also ACT and THINK like the CHRISTIAN I was instead of harboring hidden negative and judgmental thoughts that I should have 'taken captive' much, MUCH sooner. To this day, many years later, this mentor remains a friend whom I can call upon for advice, and to my great honor, he has also called me on occasion for advice AND when he saw my revised report format at a conference, he gave me the absolute highest compliment in asking me if he could adopt it and utilize it as a template for the Neuropsychology Department at UAB.

I wonder how many blessings my negative thoughts or judgments about people prevent me from receiving from God. I am going to examine and work on this again this Lent, among other things. Hopefully my story of God dealing with my prideful judgment (and turning into a blessing) is an encouragement to you.

Make it a Good Lent!

HE WILL GIVE HIS ANGELS CHARGE OVER ME

Ms. Sheila Woeger excitedly approached me at Mass recently, to share her testimony of how God intervened miraculously to save her life.



Sheila was recently on her way to Adoration. She was traveling West on 26th Street in her car. As she prepared to turn right onto State Street, "something took control of her car" and the car began to accelerate uncontrollably. Her brakes would not respond and she couldn't slow the car down. Her car then veered itself left into the path of an oncoming bus, which she "missed by only inches" by turning the steering wheel. Sheila's car missed the bus only to find herself speeding straight for one of the gas pumps at 26th and State. As she careened towards the gas pumps, she was unable to steer the car or get the brakes to work. "Something had control of the car." Unable to do anything else, she cried out to the only One who could deliver her from the plans the enemy had for her that day. Sheila yelled out the Name of Jesus, and at the last possible moment, "something" (or rather, 'Someone') took the wheel of the car and made a very sharp left turn. Sheila's car just missed the gas tanks but hit a guard rail that was between

the gas station and the cement building behind it. If there had not been a guard rail, she would have hit the cement wall head on, but she hit the guard rail instead. Sheila said that the accident was so forceful that her "car was totaled." However, she quickly added that even though her car was totaled, she walked away from that accident shaken, but *completely uninjured!* She knew that the power of Jesus' Name had saved her life. She was so excited to tell me about it and she said "that [she] wanted to give witness to what God had done for her in sparing her life. She said, "He gave His angels charge over me!" Indeed, He did!

So many people I know are in such serious battles with illness, family issues, addictions, divisions, etc., and with seemingly untimely deaths. I read an article recently by a Catholic author who referred to a testimony of a strong Christian woman who was suffering from severe illnesses that could not be identified. The Holy Spirit inspired her to put her hand on her own head and command the spirit of death to leave in the Name of Jesus. She became very nauseous and could feel something leave her body. She was aware that she had been healed at that moment.

Maybe it is just a fluke within the group of people whom I know, but I have never in my life been to so many funerals in the span of just over 2 months. I have good friends who have lost 15 people since the beginning of December. A very close friend (and strong, loving, Spirit-filled man) lost his wife in December and his grandson, a Navy Seal, in January. The devil literally tried to kill Sheila when she was on her way to pray in front of the Jesus' holy Body in the Eucharist (this should tell us something about the power of praying

at Adoration). The Catholic author of the article I mentioned also has noticed that there seems to be a lot of 'premature deaths.' He recommended asking Jesus to bind and remove spirits of death and infirmity. We should also plead the Blood of Jesus over ourselves, our families, our loved ones, our cities, etc., etc., etc.

I so am thankful to God that He heard Sheila cry out to Jesus and that the angels protected her. None of us can answer why sometimes these prayers bring healing or safety, and at other times it seems to be the will of God that people are taken early. But we must remember one thing without wavering: Jesus' name is the name that is above *every* other name! Sheila's testimony is a powerful reminder of the literal power His Name carries in the spiritual realm (which affects our physical realm). Crying out to Jesus immediately broke an evil plan, doing something humanly impossible... turning the car with no human assistance and avoiding that gas pump!
