THE ARK OF THE COVENANT AND MARY By: Deacon Andrew Froberg

There is the word of God, and there is also the WORD of God. The first phrase refers to the Ten Commandments; the latter refers to Jesus.

The Ten Commandments were given to Moses from God and made up the basic guidelines for the spiritual life of the Israelite (and later Christian) peoples. The tablets on which the Ten Commandments were written were contained within the Ark of the Covenant by God's command and above the Ark was the seat on which God appeared and spoke to the High priests.

In the book of Exodus, Moses was given elaborate instructions from God to the build the ark with painstaking detail. Although it was exquisitely beautiful and plated in gold, this is not what made it remarkable. The Ark of the Covenant was built for an exact purpose: to hold the Ten Commandments, a jar of manna, and the rod of Jesse. The Ark was the most precious and important item that the Israelites carried with them as they traveled and finally entered the promised land

The Ark was carried by the chosen Levitical priests. Miraculously, at the Jordan river, when the priests waded into the river with the Ark, the river stopped flowing. The Israelites walked into the new land on dry ground; very similar to the way they crossed the Red Sea and left their captivity. God is in every detail!

The power of God was with Israel, and that power was very strongly focused within the Ark. When the Israelites were to fight a battle, the Ark always accompanied them. The Ark eventually came to Shiloh where it remained for many years.

During the time of Judges, the Ark was captured by the Philistines. For several months the Ark was in the cities of the

Philistines. Wherever the stolen Ark remained, the people of the cities suffered. It was a curse instead of a blessing to them. It is a fitting precursor to the warning from the New Covenant: "Each one must examine himself before he eats of the bread and drinks of the cup." (1 Cor. 11:28, BSB) Again, no coincidences with God. The Philistines eventually begged King David to take back the Ark where it was once again a blessing.

The Ark contained God's word (the Ten Commandments), and God commanded that the Ark be handled with extreme reverence and respect. In 1 Chronicles 13. we read how the Ark was being carried on a cart by oxen instead of on the shoulders of Levites as God prescribed. The oxen stumbled and someone (Uzzah) reached out to steady it. The Ark was measure beyond and commanded that it not be touched. Even the priests who entered into the inner sanctuary of the Holy of Holies feared for their lives. But they were consecrated for the purpose of serving in temple. Uzzah was not. And he died where he stood. "The Lord's anger burned against Uzzah and He struck him down" (1 Chron 13: 10, NIV). After this, when the Ark was moved again (on the shoulders of Levites), King David commanded that the Ark would move 6 steps, then everyone would stop, a bull and a calf would be sacrificed, and King David and the people would dance and praise God with all of their might before proceeding again (2 Samuel 6:13-15 NAB).

The Ark was not a magic charm, but the authentic power of God was upon the Ark, and it assured the Israelites that God was with them. God communicated to them from above the Ark, which was called "the mercy seat." The power of God is everywhere, but at that time,

before the Holy Spirit was poured out freely, the people needed this physical reminder.

The Ark was brought into Jerusalem during the reign of King David and it was in the reign of his son, King Solomon, that the Ark was placed in a stunningly beautiful and regal temple, having a specific location where the Ark was contained, called 'the Holy of Holies.' The layout of this temple was based on the tents used in the wilderness, in which precise instruction had been given to Moses by God as to all dimensions and materials. The Holy of Holies was the most important part of both the traveling temple and the permanent temple. And within the Holy of Holies was the Ark of the Covenant.

The Ten Commandments were given by God to His people. Because of this importance, the commandments and the physical Ark (which is now hidden by God) were, and still are today, precious. It contained the word of God. God spoke and continues to speak to us, in the commandments. God's word is holy, and by virtue of being contained in the Ark, and the Ark being the place where God came down to meet man and speak with him, the Ark is holy and sacred.

The Ten Commandments, given by God, are His words. The words, however, are not God Himself. When Jesus was born, the world was given the WORD of God. In his gospel, St. John writes "The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us." (John 1:14, BLT). If you stop for a moment to meditate on how incredible this passage is, prepare to be overwhelmed by it. Jesus is truly the incarnate (human) WORD of the living God. Jesus is not just a prophet. He is God Himself. As Jesus did the will of the Father until His last breath, He fulfilled the new law and the New Covenant,

replacing an impossibly cumbersome old law, which had over 600 mandates.

If the Ark was so greatly esteemed by the Jewish people because it contained the word of God; how much more so should Christian people esteem Mary who also held Jesus, the Word of God, within her body? In the gospels of St. Matthew and St. Luke, it is written that Mary, a young woman engaged to a man named Joseph, was chosen by God to be the mother of His Son. When Mary accepted this responsibility and said to the angel, "let it be done unto me according to your word" (Luke 1:38 NASB), she came to hold the Word of God, Jesus Christ, within her. As Catholics, we maintain that Mary is completely without sin. It is really so simple to understand. Because she is the Mother of God (Jesus being God), she must be without sin. A sinless man cannot come forth from someone who carried (and would have passed on) the mark of original sin. Because she is without sin and the Mother of Jesus, the New Covenant, Mary is held in much higher esteem than the first Ark. The first

Ark contained words written on stone tablets, the words being from God, but the tablets themselves are not God. Jesus is God; the one in which the New law and the New Covenant is fulfilled; the human and yet divine Word of God. Just as the first Ark was greatly and reverently respected, the woman who held the new law within her womb, the Ark of the New Covenant, must be also.

Just as the tablets were not God, Mary is also not God. Nothing is by accident in the Bible. Mary is from the bloodline of David. David and his son, Solomon, built the first temple that contained the Ark. Mary's body, from the bloodline of King David and King Solomon, was the temple that contained within her womb the Holy of Holies; the Word of God. Because of who she is and what she did, Mary is greatly honored and given that reverent title of "the Ark of the New Covenant."

Shortly after receiving the Holy Spirit into her body and conceiving Jesus, Mary prophesies to her cousin Elizabeth that "all generations will call me *blessed.*" (Luke 1:48 NAB) Catholics do

not worship Mary. But we give this Ark a place of great honor, similar to the place that the Israelites created for the first Ark of the Covenant. She held within her own body the 'Holy of Holies."

The original Ark of the Covenant, which held the word of God, was highly and reverently honored. Mary, who is the Ark of the New Covenant and held our precious Jesus within her womb, the Word of God become flesh, should honored all the more.



HOLY DARKNESS By Jaci Phillips, Ph.D. (on behalf of the Executive Board of Directors of WOL CCRC)

On January 25-26th, we held the second annual vigil of 24 hours of Adoration, "Extravagant Love." We express our sincere gratitude and blessing to the religious who participated, including Fr. John Jacquel, who presided for Exposition and joined us as he was able during the vigil; Fr. Johnathan Schmolt, who lead Evening Prayer; Fr. Jerry Priscaro, who led a midnight procession of the Eucharist around the chapel; and Deacon Andrew Froberg, who presided for Benediction on Saturday morning.





There were many people who took time to come and pray and there were seven people who stayed for the whole vigil. The Executive Committee of the Board of Directors for Word Of Life was part of the group that stayed this year and last year. It is from the perspective of this group that I share some of our experiences during 'Extravagant Love.'

The first 12 hours of the vigil seem to pass rapidly. We are always surprised when we see that 12 hours have 'already' passed. It is interspersed with times of worship, corporate prayer, prayer in the Spirit, and quiet time. We also lay hands on people who come asking for our prayers. During the first 12 hours, you feel energy of the Holy Spirit and emotional consolation as you spend precious time with Jesus. You feel the power, majesty, and intimacy of being with Him.

At 11pm we had a beautiful time of worship. Violinist from the Erie Philharmonic, Louis Nicolia, joined us, which always adds such a layer of beauty to the worship. One song deeply touched us during the midnight worship: 'Holy Darkness,' by John Michael Talbot. "As we await you, Oh God of silence, we embrace Your holy night." (lyrics based on St. John of the Cross' "Dark Night of the Soul").

There are many layers of meaning and suffering in that song that we related to. Periods in our lives where there was deep deep pain and sadness, and we could not feel the closeness of God that we are all so accustomed to. Like Jesus' most dark moment on the Cross when He cried out in His holy darkness, "My God, My God! Why have You abandoned Me?!" we have felt that during our lives. At times God allows the spiritual sense of His presence and comfort to be 'hidden' from us. As Jesus continued trusting God despite His emotional feeling of aloneness, he uttered the confident words of "into Your hands I commend My spirit," showing trust in the absence of emotional connection. We recalled those periods of our lives in which we kept walking and trusting amid the deep pain of our most difficult crosses.

The song, 'Holy Darkness,' is also significant because doing this vigil is not easy. There is a point where it becomes a real spiritual battle with the flesh to remain. It becomes a cross. We have experienced it both years. This year, at around 2:45am, as Pat Montefiori and I were sitting on the floor and leaning against the first pew looking at Jesus; in the exact same place we were the year before; with every part of our bodies aching, cold, tired, and weary; we

recalled what we said last year. Pat glanced at me and said, "Didn't we say we would *never* do this again? I said, "Yes. We *did* say that" and in unison, we laughed and said, "We're *never* doing this again."

During those deep night hours, sitting with the 'God of silence,' Jesus permits us to share in the part of His Passion in which He felt no consolation, but persevered anyway. It is a true battle with the flesh, which just wants to quit and go home. Unlike the earlier hours, time passes slowly. There is little ability for us to pray during these hours. Our minds are weary, yet we do get up as a group and pray in the Spirit because we the importance comprehend continuing in our intercession. We say the rosary. We do the Chaplet. We persevere with Jesus in the deepest hours of the night. Easy? No. It's hard. Until we see daybreak. At daybreak, there is a return of some last reserve of energy; some consolation until we end.

As we prepared for this Adoration vigil, it became very clear that we were in a spiritual battle and that there were spiritual forces of evil that did not want this to happen. The core team had clear and obvious spiritual attacks to contend with, including cars that were dead for no reason and then weren't after we made other arrangements, sickness, confusion threating division (which we recognized and DID NOT allow), an unexplained fat lip, and getting there in a morning blizzard. But during that blizzard, we prayed for TA to be able to make it, and 10 minutes later, the snow stopped, the sun came out, and she made it in absolutely no snow. Even Deacon Andrew, who was not there on Friday, mentioned to me that he was aware that that miracle was for us! There are no coincidences. St. Joseph's, Bread Of Life had to suspend their Perpetual Adoration due to the cold and blizzard during the exact time that we continued the Adoration. Praise God for His plan.

We have chosen to focus on telling you about the part of this that was hard for us because we have an impression, from people talking with us, that they think we are somehow super-spiritual and just breeze right through staying all night. We want you to know it's hard for us, but

there are such graces and blessings in persevering. We know that those hours when it's not coming from our excess, but from our need; when it is like the poor widow giving her last two cents (all she had to live on, and we were at the end of our human strength to give); those are the hours that break strongholds! Jesus knows that it's hard and that we could be at home, not contending with trials of our pain and fatigue. And He honors it.

As soon as we all got home on Saturday, we were filled with such graces and consolations. We were FLOODED WITH THEM! We prayed for so many things. We prayed for the diocese, those wounded by people within the Church, for the wound that has been inflicted

upon the Church, for an end to the curse of abortion, for true revival and conversion of hearts, for the ordained, for families, the sick, and for so much more. For mercy. After we left, we all separately experienced a spiritual KNOWING that strongholds over this region were being broken and that our many prayers had been heard. Kind of like having a baby, which is so hard at the time, but when the joy comes, you aren't able to focus on the pain: we all had the same thought.... We can't wait to do it next year!

"I am going to a new church," exclaimed a friend. "I have to go where I am being 'fed.' I love this church!!!!" I have been told this many times over the years by many people- some Catholic, some ex-Catholic, some from other Christian denominations. It always forces me to consider my own choice of where I worshipand how I personally am "fed"- and what that word means to me.

I am a cradle Catholic. I have remained Catholic even though many of my close friends have decided to move to other denominations. I cannot second guess their personal decisions, but when I question my own, I am always led back to the Eucharist. Because no other denomination offers me the actual Body and Blood of Christ. Jesus promised this and He is there in the Flesh at every mass, no matter the size or location of the church. "While they were eating, Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and giving it to his disciples said, "Take and eat; this is my body." (Matthew 26:26 NAB) For me, everything else is secondary- the music, the preaching and the congregation. So I AM being "fed" by the body and blood of Christ.

Recently the Lord moved me beyond this to consider another perspective. He asked me to answer the question, "Why did God make me?" Not other people. Just

me. Why I am here? I remembered that the very first lesson in the old Baltimore catechism had the question and answer: God made me to know Him, to love Him, and to serve Him in this life so as to be happy with Him forever in the next. That simple, yet profound sentence made me realize that it is NOT about me, it is about HIM. My main focus should be to know, love and serve Him, not the other way around. If I only seek pleasing experiences, whether in music (don't misunderstand I do love beautiful worship music) or positive interactions with others (and I do love being with other Christians), then my focus is wrong. I should go to church, prayer meetings or other religious gatherings to worship our Lord, and to serve Him. That should be my purpose; the reason I am there. The fruits of those events sometimes are beautiful spiritual experiences, but should not be the reason that I go. I go to be faithful to my Lord.

Mother Teresa gives an example of how to live from this perspective. Her book of private letters revealed that this saintly woman suffered from terrible doubts and feelings of spiritual dryness and loneliness that plagued most of her adult life. She accepted her doubts as part of God's Divine will for her. In spite of the darkness and feeling that God did not love

her, she persevered. She spent two hours a day in Eucharistic adoration after daily mass and then went out and ministered to the sick and dying. She operated on blind faith, without any beautifully consoling experiences to motivate her. The only way she was "fed" was with the Eucharist. Receiving Jesus daily and worshipping him daily at adoration was enough to help her found a powerful and extremely prolific ministry. It was enough to produce vocations, conversions and bring worldwide attention to the Catholic faith, and it was enough to put her on the path to Sainthood.

So, I continue to know, love and serve God in the Catholic Church. If it was good enough for Saint Mother Teresa of Calcutta, then it is good enough for me.
