Truth – a rare commodity By Agnes Helsley

I remember the line of a song that says "What the world needs now is love, sweet love," with which we could all agree. But I am wondering if the need for truth isn't fast overtaking the need for love. We live in a time of constant communication. Words are continually assaulting our eyes and our ears, but how much truth, real truth, is being broadcast?

The late Dr. D. James Kennedy interviewed the ABC News anchorman Peter Jennings after anchor hosted that the documentary "The Search for Jesus." Kennedy was disturbed by the way the program distorted the truth, in his opinion. Jennings' memorable response was "Your truth I fully, whole- heartedly accept. But it's not everybody's truth, and you know that." Condensed, the modern perspective on truth is relative. "I have mine, you have yours, and it rude, if not downright is imperialistic and oppressive, to claim there is an objective truth that stands over all of us."

The Bible relates the incident in the trial of Jesus before Pontius Pilate when Jesus responds to Pilate's questioning if Jesus was a king. "You are right in saying I am a king. In fact, for this reason I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone on the side of truth listens to me (Jn 18:37)." Pilate's world-weary query is "What is truth?" Lack of belief in God denies an objective truth, a constant truth. We will be held accountable, that is, judged, for our response to truth.


Jesus in His priestly prayer (Jn 17:16-17) asks Father God to sanctify the followers of Jesus in truth. God's word is truth. A great "arrow prayer" for our times would be "Father, let your truth prevail in our hearts, our world." Ps. 119:160 is to the point: "All Your words are true; all Your righteous laws are eternal." God has spoken His truth in His Word. The Word of God endures forever! " Show me Your ways, O Lord, teach me Your paths; guide me in Your truth and teach me, for You are God my Savior and my hope is in You all day long (Ps. 25:4-5)." As we endeavor to fulfill our obligation as ambassadors of a heavenly kingdom, let us commit ourselves to speaking and living the truth as we await the coming of that kingdom.

The Gospel truth

"For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through Him. Whoever believes in Him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because He has not believed in the name of God's one and only Son (John 3:17, 18)."

The temptation is to limit the message to God's love for the world, but to be silent about the equally important and living truth that those who do not believe in Him will be condemned.

The sign of the cross

"I've had friends who've stopped speaking to me." remarked a Methodist pastor I was talking to, "simply because I've started crossing myself. I've reached the conclusion, for me personally, that the sign of the cross is one of the most powerful tools we have." I marveled as this young man continued to tell me of Protestant upbringing. his formation with some Catholic seminary classes, and trials in the first few years of his ministry. Sometimes it takes those who Catholics aren't cradle to appreciate the riches of our faith, in this case, the sign of the cross.

Jesus told us to "...go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holv Spirit..." (Mt. 28:19). Those words, combined with tracing the cross, the instrument of salvation Jesus chose, represent the foundation of our belief as Catholic Christians. The cross contains a tremendous amount of catechesis, most obviously the mystery of the Trinity. To make it implies a loving act of faith as we whisper the words to ourselves, recalling the hope to which our faith calls us and the love which fixed Jesus on its beams. The cross boldly states whom we belong to as we call God "Father." And in any suffering, fear or sickness we may make the sign that "...the knowing devil beholding that royal sign may flee far away trembling." (Words of St. Cyril of Jerusalem (c. A.D. 315-86). The cross has led the way for countless armies as far back as Constantine (A.D. 312),

when as he was marching into battle he saw above the sun a cross of light and the words "in hoc signo vinces," or "in this sign, you will conquer." Constantine subsequently abolished crucifixion as a form of execution and Christians began using the cross as a symbol of their faith. Christians throughout the world utilized the sign; even Martin Luther in his Small Catechism recommended it. However, in the 16th or 17th century some Protestant Reformers claimed the sign of the cross was too Catholic and stopped using it. So for a great many people the graces from this form of worship were lost.

I tell my CCD class to make the sign of the cross carefully and with respect and to try not to look like they're swatting flies. There have been books written on the power of the sign of the cross. Imagine the great shield you're making around yourself to ward off the devil. If a battle is being waged, wouldn't you want your shield made well? Let's be proud of the gift Jesus gave us in the sign of the cross and not be afraid to make it. The cross is God's power, not ours. He will show His power through us. How often do we shy away from making the sign publically? Challenge ourselves in small ways at first: try making it before meals at a restaurant. Perhaps we can be God's army in our towns and fight against a culture of death simply by making the sign of the cross.

St. Benedict's prayer

Gracious and holy God, give us wisdom to perceive you, intelligence to understand you, diligence to seek you, patience to wait for you, eyes to behold you, a heart to meditate on you, and a life to proclaim you, through the power of the Spirit of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

In 2009 I had the task of going through my late mother's things, and it was *difficult*. Every box was full of memories and treasures. Mom loved Jesus and Mary and if she stopped at a rummage or yard sale, she would bring home any religious articles she found. Some were statues in need of repair but Mom, a ceramics student, intended to repair these treasures.

I was under pressure to get the house empty and ready to sell. I picked up a large statue of Mary, and decided it was beyond help. Mary's nose and crown were damaged. Her head had been broken off and re-glued, but was done so poorly that the crack was a dark gash and her veil down her back was crooked. The rest of the stature was scratched and chipped. "Hopeless," I decided. I placed Mary's head down in the partially filled trash can in the empty kitchen. Only the base of the statue was visible, but every time I walked by, I felt a twinge of guilt. Trying to keep my resolve to get rid of stuff, I prepared a cup of tea and tossed the used tea bag in the trash can - on top of Mary.

I had a doctor appointment that afternoon so I changed clothes in the bathroom and hurried out the door. When I returned, I went to the kitchen to put a TV dinner in the oven for supper. When I turned on the light I stopped. I was stunned as I stared at the floor where the tea bag lay – in front of the trash can. There was absolutely no way the tea bag could have gotten out of the trash can. I knew that I put it in there because I felt so guilty doing it. I slowly walked to the trash can. I picked up Mary and held her close as tears dripped down my face. "I am so sorry, Mary," I cried.

Then I realized that not only had I put the Mary statue in the garbage, I had also pushed Mary out of my life. It had been a long time since I had prayed my daily rosary. I wrapped Mary in a soft blanket, resolving to find someone to restore her to original condition.

Several years went by and Mary was still in the box. I spoke with a friend who did statue repair, but she was busy with several large jobs. This spring I visited with a friend and told her my statue story. To my surprise, she informed me that her daughter is an artist and could probably fix it. She insisted that I give her the statue. When I opened the box, I was again aghast at the poor condition of the statue. "If Kathleen can't fix it, I will understand," I told her.

Within a few days, Kathleen called me and apologized that she could not restore the statue; she had to repaint. Mary's broken nose and crown were restored, her veil again perfect. And there is no evidence of the large gaping crack around her neck. She is so beautiful, and now I have tears of joy. Mary's statue is back in my life and so is her rosary. I can sometimes pray four rosaries a day, and the more I pray, the greater my joy.

I am glad that Mary did not let me throw her away.

The fire in Ann's faith

Young Ann returned from church camp glowing. The woodsy setting, new friends, Bible studies, joyful choruses, prayer times, sharing around campfires and a service of dedication all served to ignite her faith.

The next Sunday she went to church. After the intensity of her camp experience, the congregation's worship seemed lethargic. "What's the matter?" she wondered. "Don't they know Christ is alive?"

That week she made an appointment with her pastor and explained to him her disappointment.

"Ann" the pastor said gently. "You are still aglow from the church camp. Most of us were also enthusiastic when first we took Christ seriously. But bonding with Christ can loosen unless we strive to keep the relationship strong."

"Frequently," he continued, "we need to hear again how Christ still changes lives. Obviously you understand that. You could help us all if you would tell us next Sunday about how Christ has put fire in your faith, bringing you such joy and renewal. Your witness may help stir up the coals of faith in the rest of us."

Ann did just that. And that is how renewal started in one congregation.

Ministry continued in the small village, and today that initial Christ Group is an established church of 80 members who are reaching out to other

communities with the Gospel." Also, a woman named Sergeline, who had spent her life practicing voodoo. believed she was tormented by a demonic spirit. After she attended a Christ Group service she was prayed for and was healed instantly. There are reports of other remarkable healings in this area. The Holy Spirit is at work in the world, defeating Satan and nullifying his work.
