WORSHIP: THE KEY TO RIVAL By Jack Heintzel

"You are the God who performs miracles." Psalm 77:14a

As I continue to pray about the Charismatic Renewal in the Erie Diocese, I can't help but think that we need revival. Maybe you have had the same thought. It seems that we need God to *"shake us up"* so that He can do all the works that He wants to do through us. The second part of Psalm 77:14 says

"You display Your power among the peoples."

What would it take for God to act in power in *our* midst?

Dick Eastman, in the *Every Home for Christ* newsletter, provides help for us. In his article *Worship Enlists God: Fire from Heaven*, he states that true revival is always the heart's cry for any committed believer. He quotes evangelist A. W. Tozer as follows: "Whenever the church has come out of her lethargy, rising from her sleep and into the tides of revival, always the worshippers were in back of it." Worship, says Eastman, is central to every revival. Again, he quotes Tozer, "In my study and observations, a revival generally results in sudden bestowment of a spirit of worship. This is not the result of engineering or manipulations. It is something God bestows on people hungering and thirsting for Him. With this spiritual renewing will come a blessed spirit of loving worship."

Let's ask ourselves if we have a hunger and thirst for God, and a real desire to see Him act in us. It makes sense to believe that worship not only helps bring revival and sustains it, but also opens the heavens for more of God. As we see God act. worship increases and revival grows. This results in an even greater increase in our awareness of Him, which is the essence of revival.

Intercessory worship can release something of God's glory into circumstances that otherwise would seem hopeless. Let us consider how we can get into worship-saturated intercession, enlisting the fullness of God to help us in our situation. Worship provides our primary means to mobilize and release His resources. A full revelation of Jesus Christ can transform us. The lead Scripture says we have a God who does miracles. How do we tap into His power? We can do it through worshipful intercession. Psalm 77:11-12 gives us an idea of what we can do: remember what God has already done in our midst. The psalmist says:

"I will remember the deeds of the Lord; yes, I will remember Your miracles of long ago. I will meditate on all Your works and consider all Your mighty deeds."

God can and will act if we are serious about seeking His help; we can ask God to give us a deep spirit of worship. Spiritual warfare may also be involved, and our warfare is victorious only if God is in it. If we are serious in enlisting God's intervention, it is possible for His fire to come down from heaven. Let the fire fall! Come, Lord Jesus!

TALKING WITH GOD by: Mary Pat Ringhand

I recently finished a book recommended to me some time ago. It's called "The Shack" by William P. Young. Few books really teach me about the true love of God as much as this one did. The main character, "Mac," lost his young daughter in a most horrific way, and like most of us might, went into reclusion within himself. I was thinking of what I could have done differently, and wondering if the people close to him could have done something to help. And still more, would I be wondering where God was in in all this tragedy.

After some time of just existing, Mac is invited in a most unusual way to have a visit with a stranger in the place where he last knew his daughter to be. Out of pure curiosity, he goes there to meet this stranger and finds out he can find God in the most peculiar places. Not just the Father, but all three persons in the Trinity. He is able to talk to God, ask Him all the questions he has had on his mind ever since the "bad thing" happened. He is allowed to show his anger, his pain, and his sorrow to God. When bad things happen to us, do we really open our mouth and tell God how we feel? Or are we afraid that a living, totally loving God might punish us for having feelings? Do we pray with a quiet demeanor, just asking God to help us get rid of the pain? What if we had a shack, a forest, or a room in the basement where we could go and talk out loud to God? After all, when we forgive, can't we say out loud - "I forgive...I forgive...I forgive." Maybe the first hundred times or so you don't really feel the forgiveness coming out, but by voicing it, it does finally come to fruition. This was Mac's problem. He could not bring forgive, himself to thereby keeping the pain in his heart and letting "the bad" person go on scott free.

I am working on a plan to talk to God out loud, mostly for serious things, and then be still and listen for his responses. I recommend that you read this book; although it is fiction, the writer has some colorful descriptions of God and his answers for Mac. The whole thing might or might not be a dream. That's for the reader to discern.

POUSTINIA—A GETAWAY RETREAT by: Kathy Wilcox

Catherine Doherty was a Roman Catholic social worker and foundress of the Madonna House Apostolate. Ι was recently introduced to Catherine in an article written by Fr. Terry Donahue in the Companions of the Cross magazine. Of her many books, "Poustinia" (the Russian word for "desert") is well read, especially for those who encourage a "getting away from it all" retreat. As read, I realized that summertime is that period of the year when we all should "get away from it all", whether children from school and adults from workplace, and all of us from the distractions of the world.

Why get away? Catherine focuses on the spiritual growth that can occur. She encourages us to take our Bible, bread and water, and find a quiet place. This could be a cabin in the woods, a tent by a lake, or any place where we can close the door. Then we can turn off the TV and phone and be silent for at least 24 hours. During that time, we should fast, atone for our sins, and pray for ourselves, mankind, and peace. "It is ok," she calms the fearful, to "just be yourself, no one knows you better than God," so let the Spirit lead you. It is ok to nap, go for a walk, or just relax.

The fruits are amazing. "Silence is a suspension bridge that a soul in love with God builds to cross the darkness of its own mind. It is the beginning of a divine courtship that will end in the loving silence of final union with the Beloved." (from *Poustinia*).

Our own personal fears often cause us to be uncomfortable in our own skin, so we use distractions to run away. In the silence, we have nowhere else to turn to but to God. When we invite God into our heart in the silence, He will help us confront ourselves intimately and fill the dark places with His love. This interior space is now His dwelling place in our heart, and we can always go there, wherever we are; it becomes our "go to place" no matter what is going on around us. Catherine calls this "the Poustinia of the heart."

If you are not ready for an intense spiritual retreat, you can start slowly and just get away from the world for a weekend, without TV and internet. Take your family hiking, fishing, camping, or just sit by the water. Being near to the beauty of the world is healing to our bodies as well as our souls. Even those who do not believe in God are now coming to realize the healing, both physically and emotionally, that occurs when we get away from the intense noise. distractions and pressures we now live with. You will find that whether you choose a "Poustinia retreat" or a just cabin in the woods, God is there waiting for you. And in the silence, you will hear His voice.


How often can we say that we're available for whatever God wants of us? It doesn't have to be for big things; even being available for God to respond in prayer takes effort. What do I mean? First, we have to take time to pray. Second, when we're praying, we have to leave room for the Lord to talk. So often my prayer ends up as communicating to God my wishes, things I want to have happen or think I need. Even in the Liturgy of the Hours there are brief periods of silence built in, but so many skip those over. Reciting the psalms is beautiful, but how many of us rush off when it's done? Kind of like having a one-sided phone conversation where we do all the talking and then hang up before the other person can respond. Take time in prayer to let God talk, too.

Recently I was in the middle of putting up bulletin boards at the

church, when suddenly I thought I should kneel down and pray. Since I was alone in the church, I prayed out loud in tongues, praising God. Earlier in a prayer group we'd spoken about the "interceding Holy Spirit in inexpressible groanings." (Rom. 8:26) So in the middle of feeling rather joyful and glorifying God, suddenly I felt this huge weight settle on me and, without my intending it, my tongues changed those "inexpressible to groanings." The tears flowed and I felt like I was interceding for the whole world, especially those who didn't know God and in reparation for sins. I was rather detached from the whole process, in my mind thinking, Wow, this is really interesting. It wasn't how I intended to pray right then. God had definitely taken over for whatever His purpose was. But what if I hadn't taken that 5 minutes to pray? Perhaps whatever our Father needed at that moment wouldn't have happened.

God limited the work He could do among us by our willingness to work with Him (see Mk 6:5-6). He can work miracles, but He might want our faith operating and for us to physically speak to make that miracle happen. He can heal, but He uses our prayers and our laying on of hands to work that healing. Perhaps He gives a word of comfort for someone, but if we don't have the courage to speak it that person can't hear God's encouragement. God's mercy is shown through us, but if we don't respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit, how can He work? People wonder why God doesn't intervene more

in the world. Maybe it's because there are so few who makes themselves available to carry out His work. Let's stop and ask our Lord, "What can I do to help?" and then wait.

In the spring of 1989 a "Life in the Spirit Seminar" was held at Our Lady of Peace Church. This was the first time this type of seminar was held in an Erie parish. Approximately 75 people attended. In April of 1989 "Our God Reigns Prayer Group" was formed. This was a Catholic charismatic prayer group to which all God's people were welcomed. As a Catholic group, we used teachings and/or readings which were Christian-Bible-based with reference to Catholic traditions. As a charismatic group, the charismatic gifts of the Holy Spirit (1 Cor. 12) were manifested. The prayer group met each Wednesday evening for almost 23 years with a healing Mass held the first Wednesday of each month. Mass has continued until June 2017. We were extremely blessed many years age when Selah Praise Band graciously accepted our invitation to provide the music for Mass.

The prayer group has had many participants—some short-term and some long-term. We have sponsored several Life in the Spirit seminars, a Prayer of Jabez series, and a number of other events. We have had at least two prayer groups form from our group. After much prayer, and in consideration of difficulties scheduling priests and decreased attendance at Mass, we are officially disbanding Our God Reigns Prayer Group and ending the First Wednesday healing Masses.
