The Power of the Word

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." (John 1). It was silent at the first moment of creation. And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. (Genesis 1). The first words spoken came from God. He spoke and the world was created.

God is calling us to rise up and proclaim the Word, speak the Word, bring his Word to the lost, the lonely, to those who have been deceived. Pope Benedict has proclaimed 2013 the Year of Faith. He has asked us to evangelize.

We need to pray, fast, and be bold. Our own words will fall on deaf ears. The power is in the Word of God. We need to memorize scripture passages and

proclaim them for healing, for salvation, for peace, and to drive Satan out of our lives and the lives of others.

When Jesus was in the wilderness, he was tempted by the devil. Three temptations were presented, and three times Jesus said, "It is written," and quoted scripture to rebuke Satan. In the Beginning

How would I tell a child to come to Jesus? What would a child understand with only a child's capacities? One of a child's greatest assets is her imagination, so I would say to imagine Jesus much as she would an imaginary friend. Imagine him walking with her throughout her day, doing whatever it is she's doing. Talk to him as she would a friend. Imagine his responses. In a child's mind, the child knows the imaginary friend knows her better than anyone else, so there is honesty in her thinking. If situations come up where a decision between right and wrong is necessary, perhaps this will be her conscience (a.k.a. the Holy Spirit) speaking to her. If a child imagines Jesus, and not just any person, she can consider what God is thinking about what she's doing, and then (hopefully) be more likely to make the right decision. It's the beginning of always considering what Jesus would do, and whether her actions please him. Does it seem like play? Does it seem too silly? But Jesus said unless we become like children... That doesn't mean to be childish in our thoughts and actions, but to have the innocence and unconditional love and trust of children. Is it too much for us to imagine Jesus this way, like an imaginary friend? Consider it a

challenge, because this is prayer. It won't be some deep, profound experience, but it is a beginning, a turning of our thoughts to him. That's all prayer is, really. Perhaps, at first, this kind of prayer will be more relevant to us, rather than trying to sit still and think about some mystical person out there somewhere. God doesn't want to be "out there somewhere." He wants to be right here, living our life with us, walking with us step by insignificant step. Not every minute of our lives is some glorious offering to God; more often our lives are quiet, routine moments. He wants to be there, too. When we take those quiet moments and just live them with God walking with us, much like an imaginary friend, then we've united those moments to him, and it has become prayer. Is something so simple still considered prayer? Yes. Because as Jesus walks with us throughout our day we start to think differently, and rather than "I" need to do such and such, we think "we" need to do this. Our day becomes filled with "him and me." This way we're always living in his presence. We don't have to talk all the time. Sometimes he's just there with us. And if we discover we've done something without thinking of him, then just imagine him again right where you are. He's happy every time we think of him. It's a beginning. Take the challenge.

God alone judges our ministry

*"...through glory and dishonor,
bad report and good report..."*

2 Cor. 6:8

In the sixth chapter of 2 Corinthians, Paul is telling what he has gone through to spread the Gospel. He endured many difficulties, including lack of respect from many people with whom he was dealing. He knew his God-given ministry was genuine, but he was regarded as an imposter; he was well known, yet regarded as unknown. He was not thought to be important by most people. In short, as comedian Rodney Dangerfield jokingly claimed about himself, Paul "got no respect."

Perhaps we feel that way about our own ministry. We work hard, but might feel that very few people appreciate what we do. We might become discouraged because our ministry is unnoticed or considered unimportant. Our tasks may seem menial, but remember Jesus washing the feet of his disciples.

Oswald Chambers offers some advice from his book, *My Utmost for His Highest*. He says that if we really believe that our ministry is from God, we should be willing to be "broken bread and poured out wine" for him. Chambers says, "The thing that testifies for God and the people of God in the long run is steady perseverance, even when the work cannot be seen by others. And the only way to live an undefeated life is to live looking to God."

If we feel our service to God is drudgery, we should take the first step. As God inspires us to take the initiative, we can get out of

the doldrums. We might feel some self-pity. But as we arise out of our negative feelings, we will find power to overcome through Jesus Christ. In our difficulties we should understand, in Chambers' words, "God does not give us overcoming life; he gives us life *as we overcome*."

Mother Basilea Schlink, in *Behold His Love*, tells us to look at Jesus at Gethsemane. She says, "Jesus shows us that there is no need for us to know whether our ministry and sacrifice are meaningful. The reverse is true. Through his battle in Gethsemane he proved: the mightier the fruit of our ministry, the more sacrificial the way will be and the less meaningful our path will appear. The greater our ministry, the more frequent the enemy's accusation that we are wrongfully committed by going this way. But if we follow Jesus without attending to the voice of the enemy and remain obedient to God until the end, we will bear much fruit."

Consider Paul's words in Acts 20:24: "I consider my life worth nothing to me, if only I may finish the race and complete the task the Lord has given me." We should be willing to be "spent" in our service to him, not thinking about ourselves but God's call to us. Let's not look at how useful we appear, but rather make sure we are doing his will. We belong to him.

One thing we can all do: encourage one another. That will help keep us on the right track spiritually.

All is well

Horatio Spafford (1828-1888), a prominent, wealthy Chicago lawyer, is remembered for writing the beloved hymn "It Is Well With My Soul."

It seems such lyrics would come naturally to someone so successful. But Spafford didn't pen the hymn during life's high points. Instead, the words poured forth amid tragedy.

In 1871, the Great Chicago Fire wiped out Spafford's life savings. Two years later, his wife Anna and their four daughters headed to Europe on the *SS Ville Du Havre*, with Spafford to follow a few days later. The boat was struck by another vessel and sank, killing 226 of the 313 people onboard. Although Anna survived, the Spafford girls didn't.

After receiving the news, Spafford went to England to get Anna. While sailing over the spot where his daughters had died, he wrote the lyrics to "It Is Well With My Soul."

The lyrics are a reminder that no matter what life brings, our souls can be at rest in God.

*"When peace, like a river,
attendeth my way,
when sorrows like sea
billows roll;
whatever my lot, thou hast
taught me to say,
It is well, it is well,
with my soul."*
