Praise God!

February is the month when Saint Valentine's Day reminds us to love – to love our spouses, family members, and friends. We buy gifts, send cards, and whisper, sing, and even shout our love to each other. But what about God? Do we have a special time, day, month, etc. set aside to show and tell our Blessed Lord how much we love him? He certainly does not forget about us.

St. Francis of Assisi was so in love with our Lord that he gave up his wealth and took extreme personal vows of sacrifice. poverty, and prayer. He was not a writer, choosing to use his time serving others, especially the poor. One of the companions of St. Francis, Brother Leo, had a great desire to have a memorial of the words of the Lord as written by the hand of Francis. At his request Francis said, "Bring me paper and ink, for I wish to write the words of God and His praises which I have been meditating in my heart." He then wrote what has become known as the "Praises of Brother Leo." The document has been preserved in the sacristy of St. Francis' church and is one of the few in Francis' own writing.

Praise, praise, praise! In this beautiful prayer, Francis acknowledges God's greatness, majesty, and sovereignty. He continues by praising God for His love for us, for His gifts to us, and especially for our salvation. The prayer goes on to call us to praise God, the heavens and earth, every creature in heaven and on earth, and under the earth and even in the sea to praise and exalt God forever. He concludes with this:

"Almighty, most holy, most high and sovereign God, the sovereign good, everything that is good, wholly good, who alone are good: to you let us render all praise, all glory, all thanks, all honor, all blessing, and to you let us refer always whatever is good. Amen."

It is very easy to slip into our petitions when we kneel to pray, forgetting that God is love. It's too easy to forget that He responds to the love of His people by pouring out more love to us. We, who are Charismatic, have been given the gifts of praise; we can do it in tongues, as well as in song and other prayer modes. We need to make our Blessed Lord our first thought every day with prayer, praise, and thanksgiving, continuing all through the day. Intimacy does not just happen, whether with other people or with

God. We need to enter into any relationship by spending time with the person, showing and speaking of our love.

Enter His gates with thanksgiving and His courts with praise; give thanks to Him and praise His name. –Psalm 100:44

Chuck (formally Charles) Colson is one of my favorite authors. I was shocked recently by the title of an article referring to his death in 2012. The newspaper covering his death chose to refer to Colson as "Nixon's 'dirty tricks' man." While that may have been true, it seemed as though a few of his accomplishments would have been more appropriate to mention in a death notice. Colson paid for his part in the Watergate scandal by serving a prison term during which he was touched by the Holy Spirit. His conversion was referred to by many as "jailhouse religion." In truth, he was dramatically transformed by his faith and became the founder of Prison Fellowship, a movement which has greatly helped many of the prison population to come to the knowledge of Christ as their Savior. Colson also became an inspiring author of faith-building books.

Colson, like the apostle Paul, never denied his past but gave God glory for His redeeming power. We don't have to keep whipping ourselves over past sin, but we do need to thank God for His mercy. He steps into our lives announcing the good news of salvation and empowers us through the Holy Spirit to live our lives for the glory of God. What mercy we have been shown, what divine power is at work in us as we say "yes" to Him!

For all of us, part of the family of God, Paul's prayer found in Ephesians 3:14-21 is answered through the grace and mercy of our heavenly Father. "For this reason I kneel before the Father, from whom His whole family in heaven and on earth derives its name. I pray that out of His glorious riches He may strengthen you with power through His Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the saints, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God. Now to Him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to His power that is at work within us, to Him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout generations, all forever and ever! Amen."

We are called; we are chosen, and we are empowered to be representatives of the Almighty God, Who endows us with His Spirit to reveal Him to a hurting world.

The new law of retaliation

"But what I say to you is: offer no resistance to injury. When a person strikes you on the right cheek, turn and offer him the other" (Matt. 5:39 NAB). Sometimes the sayings of Jesus are really hard. It's one thing to read it and bravely think, yes, I can do this because it's what Jesus asks, but actually doing it is another thing.

Some people we can choose to associate with, others we can't. One particular person has a personality that rubs me wrong, as I'm sure I do her. If she irritates me that much I most likely annoy her as well, as there's not much we have in common. I have to believe the problem lies not so much with her as it does me. I'm far too sensitive and take things the wrong way. Often I notice when we're in a group that no one else seems bothered by her jabs, or if they do, they let it roll off and make nothing of it. See how weak I am, that I let words bother me? I so much want to ask others if I'm the only person who reacts that badly, but if they can manage not to gossip then surely I can, too.

What I need to learn is wisdom. Is there a line between turning the other cheek and standing up for oneself? How do I defend myself without starting an argument? I've no desire to debate and would rather have peaceful visits for the of everyone involved. sake Besides, if I dispute what she says I might end up saying something she'll take the wrong way. Then I'm no better. If I take the example Jesus gave during His trial, I note that He didn't defend

Himself either. He simply said nothing. Therefore I say nothing; I smile and try to gloss over the criticism. "Prav vour for persecutors" (Mt. 5:44 NAB). Do I ever! I offer Jesus the hurt at the time and then forgive over and over again every time I think about it. I pray that my problem person would see in her heart the damage her words cause, and that she would know the freedom that comes from not being concerned with other people's affairs. I pray for myself that I would be more understanding and try to see things from her point of view. I also pray for Jesus to help me "remove the plank from my own eve first" (Mt. 7:5 NAB), because if I can so easily find fault with her personality then mine can't be any better.

On the other hand, there is something to be gained out of this. Yes, I've prayed for that person extensively. It doesn't seem to me that she's changed at all, but I know I have. Time spent thinking about the Passion of Jesus is never wasted. God helped me unite my small suffering with His, and Jesus' own strength overflowed to me. Now when I'm with this other person, the stinging words don't stop but I can deal with them better. I've still a long way to go but there's hope. So why put all this trouble in an article? Because I want people to see that prayer does change things, maybe just not the way we hope. My trial didn't go away, but I'm stronger for it and can better offer the affliction to Jesus. Don't give up. Praise the name of Jesus, now and forever!

Now his sister was getting married, and Matheson worried about who would take care of him and if anyone would ever want to marry him.

Amid such despair, Matheson later shared, God gave him all four verses of this hymn in five minutes. It's a poignant reminder that God's love sustains us even when human love falls short.

The secrets of the Teddy Bear Lady

Most of the people at Chicago's Children's Hospital did not know her name. They just knew her as the sweet elderly lady in the vivid red suit who wanted to make sure that every sick child had a teddy bear to hug and caress. She kept bringing the stuffed animals, purchased with her own money, to give to ailing children. That is why she was simply called The Teddy Bear Lady.

Her name was Gladys Holm, a retired secretary for an insurance company, who lived alone in a tiny apartment in Evanston. It wasn't that she couldn't afford better, although ... no one except her attorney and stockbroker knew she was quite wealthy.

When she died at age 86, she had a portfolio worth over \$18 million. She had never married and had no heirs. Her will simply directed that the bulk of her estate be given to The Children's Memorial Hospital. Her gift was to go to medical research so that new methods of treating sick or disabled children might be developed.

The hospital authorities were absolutely shocked by the news. No one had the slightest idea that the tall, happy woman delivering teddy bears to ailing children had such wealth. As they began to piece together more of her life's story, they discovered something else. They learned that the gifts of teddy bears were really a ruse. She gave away teddy bears to learn more about the financial resources of the families of the children. 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
