Temptations

As we enter the season of Lent, the church encourages us to look inward, and honestly face our weaknesses, temptations and sins. Why is this necessary for people who believe in God? We have to remember that Satan and the other knew fallen angels God personally, but that was not enough to keep them faithful. The angels and we mortals were all given a free will. We are constantly using our will to make choices - choices which have consequences, bringing us closer to God or pushing us farther When Adam and Eve away. chose to defy God, we inherited our sin nature from them. So our nature leads us to make wrong choices. Jesus not only came to save us from eternal damnation for our sins; he also came to teach us how to make good choices. He gives us spiritual gifts to strengthen us spiritually, emotionally and intellectually.

How does temptation enter into this picture? Do all temptations come from the devil? In his book: *Interview with an Exorcist*, Fr. Jose Antonio Fortea explains that they do not. We have a free will that in itself makes it easy for us to make wrong choices. That does not mean that the evil one cannot see our weaknesses and use them to tempt us into falling out of God's graces. So, what do we do?

All we need to do is ask: What did Jesus do? Jesus was God. and as such was not vulnerable to temptation; yet he went into the desert for 40 days and 40 nights (Luke 4:1-13). He fasted and prayed to prepare for his public ministry. Satan, in his pride, thought that he could tempt Jesus away from his earthly mission. In reality. Jesus did not need to do this. Instead, He used Satan's arrogance to give us another teachable moment!

The church gives us the season of Lent, with 40 days and nights, and encourages that we follow Jesus' example. We fast to discipline our bodies, so that when we are tempted in our human nature, we can resist. We pray so that when we are tempted spiritually we can resist. We must read and know the Word of God, so that when we are tempted intellectually, we will recognize lies and use the truth to combat the enemy as Jesus did.

I have learned that temptation is a gift, one that will reveal my weaknesses, and that the sacrament of confession showers us with grace to strengthen us. It is my experience that when I confess a particular sin, I had better prepare to be tempted the minute I walk out of the confessional. It is easy to slip right back into the wrong choice; but with just a prayer, Jesus is there to give the grace to avoid sin. Each time this happens I grow stronger, and the temptation can no longer drag me down.

So it does not matter whether temptation comes from the devil or our own sin nature. We have been given the Charismatic gift of discernment of spirits. We can command the demons to go in Jesus name if Satan is the source, and we have the sacrament of confession to strengthen our human nature. We must fast, pray and confess, and then we will have the protection of the precious blood of Christ to strengthen us in all circumstances. Praise God!

Year of Unity

The committee of Catholic Leadership Groups of the

Charismatic Renewal in the U.S. has designated 2015 as the "Year of Unity" in the 5-year journey to the 50th Anniversary celebration of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit known as the Catholic Charismatic Renewal. This will take place in 2017, the year of Jubilee. The Leadership Groups are: the Alliance of Filipino Prayer Communities, the Association of Diocesan Liaisons. the Catholic Fraternity of Charismatic Covenant Communities, the National Hispanic Committee, the Haitian Charismatic Council, and the National Service Committee of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal. For several years this coalition has been working on a document called Fostering Baptism in the Holy Spirit: A Covenant of Understanding. It will be a unified attempt to promote baptism in the Holy Spirit and the use of the charisms.

Are we ready to use God's gifts? By Jack Heintzel

I assume that most readers of Reflections are Charismatic Catholics. We have been baptized in the Holy Spirit. We are looking to serve God in the power of the Holy Spirit, and to effectively spread the Gospel whenever and however we can. Our Diocesan Liaison, Fr. David Poulson. has consistently encouraged us to make more use of the spiritual gifts (charisms) we have been given by God. He emphasizes that effective use of these gifts is the primary way to draw people into the life of Christ. He reminds us of the first Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit fell in power upon the disciples of Jesus. Thev then revolutionized the world with the Gospel of Christ. He calls us to do the same to build up today's Church. We have to be more "charismatic" in our gatherings and in our daily lives; we must be overflowing with the Holy Spirit. This is what is necessary to draw people to God.

In this light I want to present an excerpt from a book entitled *The Hidden Power of Speaking in Tongues* by Mahesh Chavda. He gives us encouragement to use the Corinthian gifts. It has long been said that the gift of tongues (our prayer language) is the gateway to the use of the other eight gifts. Chavda says this:

"Through the years I have heard many people ask questions like, "Should all Christians speak in tongues?" "Is the baptism of the Holy Spirit really necessary?" Can't we get along just fine as believers without all that stuff?" "Is speaking in tongues the only way for us to 'connect' with the Holy Spirit?"

"At the heart of these questions lies the old debate over the present role and ministry of the Holy Spirit in the church. Many believers contend that being baptized in the Spirit is not 'necessary' for a Christian, and claim that they can live satisfying and effective Christian lives without speaking in tongues. For me, however, this begs the question, "Why settle for less than the best?" If the baptism of the Holy Spirit, along with speaking in tongues and all its other advantages, is readily available to all believers, why would we not want to avail ourselves of everything it has to offer?"

"The baptism of the Holy Spirit, with its accompanying sign of speaking in tongues, is important to us for several reasons. First, it connects us to the glory of God, and works to conform us to the image of Christ. Second, the language of the Spirit helps us grow in our faith. Third, it helps place a spiritual covering and protection over ourselves and our families. Just as there are pestilences in the natural world, there are also pestilences in the realm of the Spirit. It is the anointing and blood of Jesus that protect us, and the Holy Spirit is the vehicle by whom they come to us."

"We are convinced beyond doubt of the value and power of speaking in tongues. It is the language of the Spirit, the prayer language that keeps us in the atmosphere of Heaven and helps us remain sensitive to the work of God's grace in our lives and to the healing and redemption provided for us by the cross of Christ. As we learn and practice praying in the Spirit, the Holy Spirit Himself molds inside us a heart through which spiritual gifts and spiritual fruit can flow easily."

So let us seek to be more fluent in our prayer language, and more open to all the charisms. Let's not hold back in our efforts to draw people deeper into the life of Christ. Let's be more "charismatic."

While Glenn was recovering, his elder brother's wife died and one of my brothers also died. I had six brothers. Only one remains. Two sisters and one brother out of ten of us. I'm praying for an unbroken circle in heaven.

The ravages of age convinced our children (and us) that we needed to sell our home and move into senior living. Steps, snow and grass were becoming enemies! The house sold in one day! Three couples looked at it. Three couples wanted to buy it. Amazing, did they know the little things I thought would be drawbacks? Low ceiling in family and upstairs room bedrooms -- apparently that didn't matter.

The closing was on November 12, Glenn's birthday. We moved to Parkside to an apartment I thought would be dark but it was available. Our house was sold, the new residents had a lease ending on the closing date and they were in, we were out! The Parkside director said that we could move to a "western exposure" apartment when one became available. Lo and behold, the leaves dropped off the trees when we had that 13 or so inches of snow at the end of a beautiful warm (69 degrees) moving week. There is light, the apartment is charming and I am exhausted from packing and moving. Let us stay here. Oh no, the apartment has been taken by another couple with a pet and desirous of first floor ease to the outdoors. The director has found us the "western exposure" residence. Oh joy, we move again. Fifty-five years without moving and now twice in one month. I have been assured that moving within the building will be a piece of cake. Yeah, sure.

We have one certainty. Our God is faithful. We have been freed of much stuff accumulated over the span of 55 years. We are ambulatory, taking nourishment, and of reasonably sound mind. We are ready to begin the next leg of our journey heavenward. Praise God, His love is everlasting!

No regrets

At one time or another we all regret something. You may regret something you said, or that you didn't say something. You may regret that you stayed too late, or that you went too early. You may regret that you won something or that you lost. But in all your life, you'll never regret being kind.

An anonymous testimony

I wanted to share this testimony to say how much the Lord has been helping me since I've been attending a prayer meeting. Since I've going to a prayer group since April 2014, the Lord has shown me things from the past I had buried and had never forgiven myself for. I was not able to do this on my own, but because He is my Savior, He gave me the ability to see myself as He does and to forgive myself and not carry those burdens anymore. He gave me to know I was forgiven and free from them a long time ago in His eyes, and it was no longer a sin I had to feel guilty about. He gave me to know there is no condemnation in Christ. I want to tell the whole world that my heart was broken and He healed me.

Of swastikas and memories

Have we, as Christians, forgotten who we are? Are we letting the devil wear away our identities? I ask because of a couple recent events that occurred, both having to do with the swastika. It may not seem like there is a connection, but let me explain.

A few months ago I was flipping through my grandpa's 1939 yearbook. Under his name there were several activities listed, one of which was the Swastika Club. My grandpa fought in C Company from Illinois in the Rhineland, and I knew he'd have nothing to do with what the swastika represented. A quick phone call revealed the Swastika Club was a literature group. I did some research and discovered that way before Hitler, the swastika was a worldwide symbol of good luck and prosperity for everyone from the Egyptian to the Native American. It only gained its negative connotations when Hitler used it to represent the Nazi Party in Germany. My grandpa said it was too bad that one man took something good and used it for evil, and now that's all anyone recognizes in it.

The other event happened in December when Hallmark had to recall some wrapping paper put out for Hanukkah that bore the swastika symbol on it. Anyone reading articles about that story hopefully now knows the previous meaning attached to the symbol. But both stories cause me to wonder. God created people to be good, but the devil laid claim to us through sin. It seems to me the devil is trying to

do the same thing to Christians, making us forget our original good purpose of living for God. One way he's doing this is by causing us to forget to keep Sunday holy.

Sunday, the day of rest for Christians (or Saturday for Jews), unique to Judeo-Christian is culture. Even before the time of Christ other cultures had their holidays and celebrations, but none had a day of the week reserved for rest and worship. To foreigners that seemed a bewildering thing, but it marked the Israelite people and gave them identity. The Israelites knew that when God was done with creation He rested and joyfully claimed the last day as a sign of unity between Him and His people. Throughout the centuries they would take that Sabbath day as a reminder of their identity, God's people. They would retell their story in the course of their worship and gain strength in the remembrance, God blessing them and they blessing God.

however, Today, many don't attend Christians their worship services, much less keep Sunday as a day of rest. If we are as busy with activities on Sunday as we are during the rest of the week and fail to honor God, we're denying our souls the activity it finds most refreshing: worship of God. If our minds are kept busy with things other than God, then we slowly forget who we are and our purpose. Satan more and more claims us for himself. Any non-Christian wouldn't recognize many of us as any different from anvone else.

I know I'm horrible at keeping Sunday as a day of rest. After attending Mass, my day is usually filled. I sincerely pray that I, along with anyone else who struggles with this goal, can reprioritize and remember why we take a day of rest and worship. I pray that in this new year we will hold fast to the person God created us to be and remember our beginnings.

Lisa Hall Anderson is a chaplain at St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital in Memphis. She tells of going into the hospital chapel one morning and finding a young mother on her knees. She looked up when she heard Chaplain Anderson and the chaplain apologized for disturbing her. "Oh that's okay," she said, "I was just complaining to the Lord. I figure it worked for the Israelites so I'm giving it a try." They both laughed at that and then began to talk about how God listens to us regardless of our approach.

In writing about the experience, Chaplain Anderson quoted Exodus 16:9 where Moses said to Aaron: "Say to the whole congregation of the Israelites, "Draw near to the Lord, for he has heard your complaining."" One has the feeling that God can handle whatever we have to say or whatever we think in our prayer life.
