Why purgatory? By Amy Mosbacher

"Who can ascend the mountain of the Lord? Or who may stand in His holy place? He whose hands are sinless, whose heart is clean...." Ps. 24:3-4 NAB

Those are pretty lofty standards for us mere humans. Yes, we have free will to choose not to sin, but it's in our fallen nature to sin. Even after we're baptized and perhaps make frequent confessions, we still sin. And, unless we're fortunate enough to make a worthy last confession, we will most likely die with sins still on our soul. That kind of blocks us out of the above category "whose hands are sinless..." Thank heaven we have a merciful God who doesn't limit us to heaven or hell! Those who, at death, accept God's love and mercy but aren't yet worthy to see Him face to face, are cast into purgatory. While it may sound correct to say a soul is going "to" purgatory, purgatory isn't so much a place as it is a process. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church. imperfectly "undergo purified souls purification after death," a state in which they are purged of their sins, hence the name purgatory (#1054).

So where is purgatory mentioned in the Bible? The first mention is found in 2 Maccabees12:46 (RSV), "Therefore [Judas Maccabeus] made atonement for the dead that they might be delivered from their sin." However, this isn't the only place the concept of "waiting souls," souls being neither in heaven nor in hell, is mentioned. Purgatory is also implied in Revelation 6:9-11 and more specifically in 1 Peter 3:18-19, in Peter's letter, after stating that when Christ's body was put to death and His Spirit made alive, "Christ ... went and preached to the spirits in prison."

The question keeps coming up: why do I need purgatory? I have faith in Christ, I've led a good life, that's enough isn't it? A little concrete example of purgatory that I like to use is this: Suppose you're at a friend's house and you have an argument. In a fit of rage you punch a hole in the wall and stomp Later you return and out. apologize (confession). That's wonderful for the relationship, but there's still a hole in the wall. Now you need to repair the hole and clean up the damage (penance). Confession is good for the soul, but doing penance, something to heal the hurt, also brings one close to God. The two go hand in hand. Penance can also be a very humbling experience in which one acknowledges that God is God and

we are His creation, a good viewpoint to have in heading down a narrow path.

This doesn't mean we can err as much as we want in this life and have purgatory as a safety net. According to the saints in their private revelations, doing a little bit of penance in this life can take years off the suffering of purgatory. Why cause our waiting to see God to be longer than needed? Imagine, "No eye has seen, no ear has heard, no mind has conceived what God has prepared for those who love Him." (1 Cor. 2:9)

Forgiveness is the key

Around the year 1800, William Carey sat at his cobbler's bench repairing shoes and looking at the map on the wall in front of him. He prayed for various nations that were known to be in heathen darkness. His heart was heavy with concern for those people. Then he was struck with Jeremiah 33:3 (The verse commonly "God's phone known as number.") "Call to Me and I will answer you and tell you great and unsearchable things you do not know."

From that scripture Carey formed the motto for his life -ATTEMPT GREAT THINGS FOR GOD. EXPECT GREAT THINGS FROM GOD. Carey left his cobbler's bench but kept the map in his heart. He decided to take the Gospel to the entire heathen world. Ouite an ambitious undertaking!

Was he successful? At the time of his decision there were no more than 200 million people who professed faith in Christ. Less than 200 years later there are about two billion people committed to Christ as Savior – a tenfold increase since Carey began his mission. He inspired many others to participate in the great endeavor to bring Christ to a hurting world. He was the first Protestant missionary to arrive in India. The great lesson of his life's work is to expect great things from our great God.

Our God is able to do immeasurably more than we can ask or think. Consider the limitless size of the universe He

created to display His glory, the countless galaxies with billions of stars which boggle our minds as we begin to fathom them. Consider that He is intimately involved in the lives of all His creation. Father God, be glorified in our lives as we yield to Your Spirit.

Philip Yancey, in a devotional I recently read, brings truth to bear on our recognition of the prayer, effectiveness of "A believer prays, and heaven responds. A sinner repents, and the angels rejoice. A mission succeeds, and God is glorified. A believer rebels, and the Holy Spirit is grieved." Yancey goes on to say, "I believe these things, yet somehow I keep forgetting them. I forget that my prayers matter to God. I forget that the choices I make today bring delight or grief to the Lord of the universe. I forget that I am helping my neighbors to their eternal destinations."

Father, keep us faithful, as You are faithful.

They believed that spectators and inquirers weren't ready for the power and mystery of the prayer. It was called the "believer's prayer." Even today in the liturgy



Orthodox Church, the praying of the Lord's Prayer is a moment of awe and mystery as a priest says at the introduction: "And make us worthy, O Lord, that we joyously and without presumption may make bold to invoke thee, the heavenly God, as Father -- and to say, 'Our Father, ...'"

Jesus does not want us to say the Lord's Prayer. Jesus wants us to become the Lord's prayer. REAL praying is God moving in us through the Spirit. Real praying is the Spirit of God praying in and through us, making us into the likeness of Christ. In the words of Francois Fenelon; "Lord, teach me to pray. Pray thyself in me." Prayer is the breathing of the soul.

First. I would like to thank everyone for responding to God's call with your time, talent, and resources. The Center is very blessed to have SO many committed people take part in this ministry. As you have heard me say before, you are the Center; we could not do such good work in serving the Lord without each and every one of you. From the bottom of my heart, thank you. As always, you remain in my prayers. God continues to bless this ministry through you.

The year 2014 is shaping up to be year of transition for the Center. We have a new diocesan liaison, Fr. David Poulson, who has been named for a term of five years. Let's take this time to welcome Fr. Poulson! How blessed is the Charismatic Renewal to have him at the helm! God has certainly answered our prayers!

With the retirement of longtime Administrative Assistant, Barbara Schlosser, the Center will attempt to eliminate the position of Administrative Assistant due to lack of finances to fund this position.

The Center also continues to transition from a role of <u>originating</u> Charismatic activities to a role of <u>facilitating</u> others in planning Charismatic activities. Fruits of this transition include: the Albion prison prayer group, the "All Things New" retreat for college students and young adults, the Life in the Spirit Seminar at Holy Rosary, and the planned prayer group for the Cambridge Springs women's prison, slated to begin this spring. I am also hoping to soon name a prayer brunch chairperson and a women's retreat chairperson to oversee these events. If anyone would be interested in either of these positions, please let me know.

We plan to continue activities including eleven editions of the *Reflections* newsletter, three prayer brunches, Life in the Spirit Seminars at both the Albion prison and the Cambridge Springs prison, the membership/volunteer the Charismatic dinner. conference, Life in the spirit seminars conducted at various parishes, and some type of women's retreat or day of reflection.

Planned additions for this year include the prayer group at the Cambridge Springs Women's Correctional Facility and a possible women's day of renewal. I will continue to work to maintain relationships with Cursillo, Youth and Young Adult Ministry for the Erie Diocese, the Office of Communications for the Erie Diocese, and the Campus ministry program at Penn State Behrend, among other offices and ministries.

I will continue to maintain and update the Center's Facebook page, Twitter account, and web page, now formatted for use with hand-held devices. I would invite you to check out these pages if you are able. The Center continues to try to "do more" with less funding. Continuing to streamline expenses in every avenue is very important at this time. If anyone has not filled out a pledge card and would like to do so, please contact the Center for the appropriate paperwork.

Beyond finances, I need to address our need for volunteers in key positions. We are in need of people to offer their talents on the board of directors, to serve as chairpersons for events, to be writers for the newsletter, along with many other tasks. My journey to "The Way" By Kathy Wilcox

I watched a movie called *The* Way and liked it. I wanted to know more about it, and in researching the movie I discovered a book with the same title. There is no connection between the two although both are Catholic in origin. I purchased the book, and was introduced to the author. Josemaria Escriva, who has had such an impact on this century that Pope John Paul II canonized him on October 6, 2002, calling him "the saint of ordinary work." So who is this priest, now Saint Josemaria?

Josemaria was born in 1902 in Barbastro, a small town in Spain, and was raised in a faithful Catholic home. At 16 he was at prayer and was convinced that God had something special for him to accomplish. Because of that, he entered the seminary and was ordained at age 23. By the time he was 25 he had traveled to Madrid to study for a graduate degree in the Law. He was also supporting his widowed mother and siblings by tutoring law students, and in his spare time he had an extensive ministry to the sick and the poor, especially children. He enlisted his law students, professionals, his mother and other women to assist in the mission to the poor. This work was the early beginnings of what became the religious organization, Opus Dei, formally known as the Prelature of the Holy Cross. Opus Dei (Latin for "Work of God") became an institution of the church and was given final \approval in 1950. The basic teaching is that everyone is called to holiness and that ordinary life is

a path to sanctity. Most members are lay people. With more than 90,000 members the society is established in over 90 countries. There are some who have criticized Escriva, accusing him of taking sides in the Spanish Civil war that tore the country apart from 1936 - 1939. I could not find real evidence of this, only that he tried his best to minister spiritually to the needs of the people. He also worked to help the innocent victims of the war, which killed many more civilians than soldiers. We can be sure that his background intensely was scrutinized in the canonization process.

The Way is not really a book, but in the author's words provide "useful notes for those who want to have an interior life" I found it a "to do" list for personal sanctity, with 999 pointers. The suggestions are loosely organized into topics, but you could skip around and still be inspired. There are no deep theological concepts here; there are no profound insights - just common sense "helps." Another of the criticisms of Josemaria concerns his views on mortification. Here are two that are under that topic:

#193- "Don't be namby pamby! It's time you get rid of that peculiar pity that you feel for yourself."

#174- "Don't say, "That person bothers me. Think: That person sanctifies me!" Suggestions for personal growth:

#596- "Don't feel hurt when others see your faults. What should really distress you is the offense against God and the scandal you may give."

#686- "All right: that person behaved badly toward you. But haven't you behaved worse towards God?"

Lent is defined as a time for prayer, penance, repentance, almsgiving, and self-denial. I will be turning to *The Way* this Lent, knowing that the "useful notes" of Saint Josemaria will help keep me on track!

(Ed. Note: while there have been allegations of secrecy against Opus Dei, we offer this article simply to make the reader aware of the spiritual value of Father Escriva's writing. We trust that his writing is validated by Pope John Paul II's canonization of Escriva and subsequent recognition by Pope Benedict XVI.)
