We have seen headlines in the news recently about athletes who refuse to stand for our National Anthem. They are making a statement, they say, in protest about how some individuals in our country are treated. So they are sitting when almost everyone is standing in respect to our flag and to our country. Their actions are not really something new, however. We in the Catholic community should remember when President Clinton and his wife Hillary sat in protest, too.

The occasion was the National Prayer Breakfast, and the invited celebrity was (now Saint) Mother Theresa of Calcutta, who had received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979. Her address was about the value of life and against abortion. When she stopped speaking there was a hush and then an explosion of applause, and a standing ovation that lasted a solid five minutes. Bill and Hillary Clinton did not stand, however; they sat in stunned silence.

They chose to sit, rather than stand in respect because they disagreed with her message: "Any country that accepts abortion is not teaching its people to love, but to use any violence to get what they want," she said. "This is why the greatest destroyer of love and peace is abortion." They chose to not stand for the life of the unborn; they instead remained seated to support the right of women to kill their babies.

Many are not concerned about whether folks sit or stand for our Anthem, saying it is a free speech matter. The more important issue, however, is that we are all being forced to look at our own position on social and moral issues, and to evaluate what we really will stand for. And each of us must ask: what will I protest? Am I willing to stand up for someone who has been wrongly accused? Am I willing to walk in a prolife march and stand up for the unborn? Am I willing to refuse to listen to an off-color joke and walk away? Do I choose to not acknowledge that I am a Christian because those I am with are not?

It is time to realize that we now live in a secular country

and it is becoming more and more common that if we are Christians we are the odd ones, not the majority. So how will we deal with it when being a Christian is considered strange, or old fashioned or even a threat to others? What will we choose? Better still, whom will we choose? We need more than anything else, to stand up for Jesus, in all things, in all circumstances, at all times.

So, will I sit or will I stand? Will I speak or will I remain silent? Jesus told us how important these daily decisions really are. "Whoever acknowledges me before others, I will also acknowledge before my Father in heaven.(Matt. 10:32)."

Mary's Faith, Hope and Love By Amy Mosbacher

So much is said about the mysteries of the rosary, and truly, we'll never be finished contemplating all they contain. However, I want to examine the first three Hail Marys before the mysteries, which are so small they could be overlooked. We pray them for faith, hope and love and then quickly move to meditate on bigger scenes. But let's stop for a moment and consider how we can invite our Holy Mother Mary to take our hands and make our hearts like hers as we pray.

Offer the intentions of faith, hope and love for the Hail Marys, but add another: honoring Mary as Daughter, Mother and Spouse, which coincide perfectly with the other virtues. First, think of the Virgin Mary as the daughter of the Father and the virtue of *faith*. The relationship a child has with her parents is one of reliance and trust. The child trusts the parents to take care of her, provide for her needs and love her. (Hopefully, it would never even occur to a child that a parent wouldn't do those things.) Our Father gives good things to those who ask Him (Mt. 7:11), and if He says "no," or if something doesn't make sense, there is still trust that our Father is doing what's best for us. That's faith. Mary's relationship with the Father was never tarnished with sin and she trusted Him implicitly. We can ask her to help our faith and trust in God to grow.

The next virtue is *hope*, and we can add to that honoring Mary as Mother of Jesus, or Mother of Hope. Jesus is our Hope in all occasions; our hope that there is more than this life, that this current suffering will pass away and we'll be better for it. When Our Lady heard Jesus say He would be killed and rise again, she may not have understood, and she still had to go through the agony and sorrow; but her faith and hope in the Father and Jesus kept despair at bay. We can ask Mary to strengthen our hope in God as our lifeline when life gets rough.

Finally, we pray for the virtue of *love*, and we honor Mary as Spouse of the Holy Spirit. We give glory to God when all of our actions, whatever deeds of mercy, whatever kindness we show, are motivated by love. And "God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit (Rom. 5:5)." We can ask Our Lady to help us love with her Immaculate Heart, since her heart is bound as Bride to the Holy Spirit. Also, ask Our Mother to help prepare our hearts for the mystical union with God. Being one with God is His desire for us, so why wait for Heaven? Ask Our Lady to help us desire to be espoused to our Beloved as well.

Once we've honored Our Lady as Daughter, Mother and Spouse, we can continue praying the rosary knowing that she will help us to grow ever so much closer to God in those beautiful virtues of faith, hope and love.

Prayer Brunch August 25, 2016

Betty Ferguson was our invited speaker for the August prayer brunch, but she brought more than words. She opened her heart and shared her memories. her grief and her painful journey to God -- and finally forgiveness. Betty's life changed forever over 40 years ago in 1975 when her oldest daughter was brutally murdered. It took months before Betty discovered, after hiring her own private investigator, that Debbie was killed by a man who was known by her husband, and was her daughter's teacher, Raymond Payne.

Betty was so devastated by her daughter's tragic death, that she could not even attend the funeral or wake. Her younger children no longer had a mother, and were profoundly affected as well. They all failed the school year that Debbie was murdered. She went on to explain, "For 11 years I stayed pissed off, hurt, and angry. The anger was running my life. I took my anger everywhere I went -- to bed with my husband, to work, shopping, everywhere. 'Damn him, damn him.' My children were angry, too. They were copying their mother."

As Betty sought help, she met with a hypnotist who counseled her to forgive her daughter's killer. But she did not want to hear it or to stop being mad. Then her son joined a hippie group and came home with a T- shirt that said *Forgiveness is my favorite* "*F*" *word*. Her sister died, and at the funeral, she heard the Lord's Prayer recited and again heard "forgive." God finally got her attention, and she realized that forgiveness could save her life.

Betty learned that while forgiveness is a decision it does not just happen. A battle waged between her heart and mind. God was whispering in her heart that she should forgive, but in her mind was the cold fury for the person who had taken her precious first-born child. So a mantra begin, she had to repeat "I forgive Ray" thousands and thousands and thousands of times. After many months she awoke one day and felt a huge weight being lifted off her body - she was free. She had finally forgiven Ray. The story did not end there. Betty began working at the Crime Victims Center in 1986 and found that the center was arranging meetings between victims and offenders. The meetings were resulting in healing for both sides. So she went to visit Ray Payne in prison (he was sentenced to a life sentence without parole for Debbie's murder) and additional healing occurred. She continues to visit him.

Even after 40 years, the pain this dear woman experienced was in her voice and demeanor. She told her story in short sentences, the only way she could tell it, because this tragedy had broken her in many ways. While the anger was finally gone, there is still grief and loss. But she is telling her story, and she was able to smile when she showed us her daughters beautiful senior picture, and God's love shone in her face as she encouraged us to choose forgiveness. God is her companion in her continuing journey to wellness. God is bringing his healing to her broken heart and forgiveness opened the door.

Thank you, Betty, and may God continue to pour out his grace on you and your family.

If you forgive others the wrongs they have done to you, your Father in Heaven will also forgive you.



On September 11, 2001, Stanley Praimnath was working on the 81st floor of the World Trade Center South Tower when he saw an airplane flying directly toward him. Stanley prayed a quick prayer as he dove under a desk for protection: "Lord, I can't do this! You take over!"

The terrible impact of the plane crash trapped Stanley behind a wall of debris. But as he prayed and cried for help, Brian Clark, a worker from another office, heard and responded. Making their way through rubble and darkness, the two found their way down 80 flights of stairs to the ground floor and out.

When encountering terrible threats, David asked God for help. He wanted to be assured of God's nearness as he faced enemies in battle. In a heartfelt petition David said, "Be my rock of refuge, to which I can always go, Do not be far from me, my God; come quickly, God, to help me" (Ps. 71:3, 12).

We aren't promised deliverance from every difficult situation we face. But we can be confident that God hears our prayers and will walk alongside us through everything.
