When Mercy Chooses Us

There are some times when my selfishness astounds me. But perhaps I'm jumping into the middle of a story. Let me back up a bit.

All year long my teenage daughters acquire service hours from Confirmation hours to school projects. We've talked a lot about the Year of Mercy and the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. We've also talked about the signatures they have to get to prove they did the work. Some of this work they've done for years, but now to get credit someone has to acknowledge it with their signature. It made a pretty good comparison for the "credit" we get with God. When we do works of mercy we need to be inconspicuous. "So when you give to the needy, do not announce it with trumpets, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and on the streets, to be honored by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward in full. But when you give to the

needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you." (Mt. 6: 2-4) If our hearts get filled up with human praise then we'll have no room for God's praise, which is the only praise that matters.

How easy it is to do merciful works when we're feeling generous! But how much more beneficial it is for our souls to do a work when we don't feel like being merciful. Recently, I was visiting my mom in Illinois and an opportunity for mercy presented itself. wasn't what I had planned and what quite a bit away from the direction I was going, but I did it. As I sat there with the person, I knew full well how begrudging I felt. "These people honor me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me." (Mt. 15:8) That was me. I knew my attitude was lousy and Jesus was

expecting better from me, but my heart just wasn't in it. I to remember someday I could be in that situation, and how happy I would be if someone did this for me. The experience was humbling extremely reminded me I have such a long way to go. Sometimes being merciful is hard, and if there's no love, then there's no merit. (Remember, love is an action, not just a feeling.) At the same time, I was glad God chose me to display His mercy to someone as it reminded me again of how desperately I, myself, need His mercy. We're perfect, but through opportunities like that one God can stretch us, further us on the road to Him. Thanks be to God!

Charismatic Renewal and Young Adults

"The United States has a young adult problem." I cannot tell you how many times I have heard that statement over the past few years. Between 70 and 80% of young Catholics who are active in their faith at age 15 are inactive by age 28. They leave the Church for a non-denominational congregation (often with a Pentecostal style of worship) or they fall into the ever-expanding category of people who label themselves as a "none."

But I do not think it is fair to say the Church has a young adult problem. Young adults are not the problem. If anything, they are the great hope for the Church. The challenge for the Church is to present the fullness of the faith to young adults in a way that is transformative and transcendent and empowering for young people to live the faith. In that way, charismatic renewal is our great hope and holds the key to reclaiming lost generations. The Holy Spirit is the only one who can, in times of great relativism, materialism, and growing atheism, break through the great cloud of deceit and indifference and like a lighthouse, guide the young Church back into His loving arms.

So much has been written about this current generation. They have been labeled "Generation Y," the "Mosaics" and the "iGen." They have been described as narcissists, self-centered, entitled, hedonistic and lazy. We need to stop la-

beling young adults and start getting to know them. Many of the young adults I know struggle with self-identity, anxiety, and depression. They are not hostile towards religion, they just have not seen a true living witness of a joyful disciple. They have become skeptical of institutions—especially gions. The sexual scandals of the Catholic Church, not to mention the throw-away attitude towards life and marriage that have been the hallmarks of their culture have left them questioning everything.

On the campus of Franciscan University where I work, hundreds of students go through a Born in the Spirit retreat each semester. This is part of the transformative experience of being a student at Franciscan and helps prepare the graduates we send forth to serve the Church in lay and religious vacations and ministries. The Holy Spirit is active and alive in the hearts of young Catholics and He is restoring the hearts and lives of young adults everywhere He is invit-

The Holy Spirit will come in the way He sees fit for this new generation. Young adults need mentoring based on authentic love and relationship. Finally, we need to be empowering young adults for mission. Young adults want to make a difference. There has never been a bigger "difference maker" in the life of the Church than Pentecost. We need to pray for this to happen again.

"I know that there are differences between denominations regarding doctrines." I responded, "but when I die, I will meet Jesus and I really don't think he will give me a quiz on doctrine. He will ask me if I love Him and if I have loved others. So if you have found a church where you have a personal relationship with

Jesus and feel loved, then I am happy for you."

I noticed that her husband standing behind her was getting very uncomfortable, and tapped her arm to get her to end the conversation. She again repeated "the Catholic Church lies," and walked away.

I was shaken by the confrontation, and when I had time to regain my composure, I thought of many other things I could have explained. But after further reflection, I understood that there was nothing I could have said to change her mind. I also realized that she was actually trying to evangelize me, to get me to leave the Catholic Church just as she had done.

I then reflected on my own experience. I remembered that I was led to the Charismatic Renewal by a young woman who said nothing about doctrine. She was kind to me. She befriended me. She radiated God's love so powerfully that I finally told her that I wanted what she had. And then she shared her faith.

I am praying for this dear lady, that she seeks and finds the love of God. God's love is not found in doctrines; it radiates from those who have asked him into their heart.

On June 11 of this year I tripped while leaving a grocery store. There was no reason for the fall except perhaps my negligence. Consider eight falls in a span of a year, always falling forward coming down on both knees. Looking back I am sure God was sending a message to a very obtuse child of His.

The result of this fall was a broken leg, a post-polio leg that was a questionable leg to stand on but the only left leg I had! I now had a broken femur, patella and two large bones which resulted in surgery with a plate with many screws and an immobilizer and a non-weight bearing status for six weeks. I found comfort in reciting Scriptures. A hospital staff member asked me if I knew the Our Father. I recited that for her and returned to my Scripture recitation. I could not understand her aversion to what were genuine prayers for strength and peace. The pain was overwhelming.

After three days in the hospital I was transferred to Sarah Reed where I met many beautiful people who were extremely caring and capable. I imagined that tiny little knitting needles were beginning the healing process. A dear friend brought me an excellent book on the value of proving God, trusting His Word to be valid in our lives. Aha, the real secret for my crying out to my Savior for help—His Word is true and He honors His promises!

There were many people to pray for while doing rehab,

many tears to help dry. I was privileged to share prayer with new friends, get reconnected with old friends and in general become more aware of how blessed I am with a loving husband, generous family providing for his needs in my absence. I did not lack company, flowers or words of encouragement. During my confinement there were three family members who passed away and also a few friends. Life is a gift given us. God knows exactly the day we are to arrive in this world, what day we will depart, and the means by which He will take us. We are His people, created for His glory, surrendered to His purpose.

May God bless our healthcare givers, and give us grateful hearts for all His benefits. I am finally back home at Parkside. I have a long, hard road to healing but I am walking with Jesus every step of the way!
